Student Achievement - Year 5 Student, Grace Wilson

One of our Year 5 students, Grace Wilson has been named as the Year 5-6 statewide winner of the '2021 What Matters? Tasmania Writing Competition'. This is an outstanding achievement for Grace in being the upper primary recipient of this very prestigious award.

The 'What Matters? Writing Competition' is an initiative of the Whitlam Institute described as a 'catalyst for young thinkers and young writers to develop a perspective, a point of view, on where we're heading as a society.'

Annually, the competition attracts thousands of entries covering a wide range of subjects. Grace's piece is titled 'Edge of the World' and explores a moment in time before 'nature disappears' and 'Before all of the Earth's hard work disappears.'



Grace is to be commended on developing such an evocative piece of writing and for continually challenging herself by pushing writing boundaries and for having the courage to put her writing into the public domain for critique.

Thank you to Mr Ben Crick, Grace's class teacher, for encouraging her extension and building her capacity as a talented young writer.

Students making an Environmental Difference

Two weeks ago, I spoke to K-6 students about trying to make a difference in our own lives to be more environmentally conscious, particularly around our use of plastics. In response, Year 6 student, Toby Sutcliffe has begun a sustainability project at home with his family.

The Feast of the Assumption 15 August

Sunday 15 August the Church celebrates the Feast Day of the Assumption of Our Lady when according to our faith, the Holy Mother, 'having completed her course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory'.

The Assumption signals the end of Mary's earthly life and marks her return to heaven to be reunited with Jesus. While the bodies of both Jesus and Mary are now in heaven, there is a difference between the Assumption and the Resurrection. Where Jesus arose from the tomb and ascended into heaven by his own power, Mary's body was taken up to heaven by the power of her Son. For this reason we use different words to describe each event. One is the Ascension of Christ and the other, the Assumption of Mary. This special day is a Holy Day of Obligation for all Catholics.


The biannual Festival was unable to proceed as planned in 2021 but is making a confident return to provide the opportunity for us to offer a snapshot of the creative activity that is occurring on a day-to-day basis at the College.

The Long Gallery Exhibition opens Thursday 25 to Sunday 29 August. The Gallery is open from 10.00am to 7.00pm Thursday to Saturday and 11.00am – 3.00pm on Sunday.

Public performances for *HARD TIMES* are Thursday 26 and Friday 27 at 6.30pm and there will be a 5.00pm matinee on Saturday August 28. Written in 1854, *HARD TIMES* is Dickens's most political novel. The setting was a mythical place called Coketown, partly inspired by a visit to the Northern industrial town of Preston where he had observed a strike. He conveys what life was like in factory towns and presents his larger-than-life characters, rich language and allows the narrative to tumble episodically along. It has been chosen to challenge our performers, but also to present the opportunity to introduce our audiences to the work of the most celebrated storyteller of the Victorian era.


The Book Fair provides many benefits and opportunities for students and their families to engage with and share their passion for reading and all things books including:



Our new sessions are on Thursdays and Fridays 9.15-10.30am and 11.15am-12.30pm

LEARNING IN FOCUS



Creative Writing 2021

Creative Writing in 2021 has seen students developing skills in a number of different writing forms.

In Term One, students completed units on Short Stories and Journalism. The Short Story unit asked students to create a short story utilising a number of narrative skills to develop plot, character, tension, and theme.

Journalistic writing asked students to consider the question of 'what is 'news'?' and sent them out into the community to come up with stories which were written to convey the significance of the various goings-on and happenings they encountered.

In Term Two, the focus shifted to Poetry and Personal Writing. Students studied ten different poetic forms, became familiar with their structures (looking at both rhythm and rhyme), and replicated these forms to create deeply personal and beautifully articulated poetry portfolios.



So far in Term 3, students have dipped their toes into the colourful world of Children's Stories. A key focus of this unit is to consider the vital interplay between words and images to create a story which can not only entertain a child, but teach them a valuable moral or lesson. Students will finish the term writing one-act plays.



As always, throughout the year students have had an opportunity to work on their folio presentations which will comprise the course in Term Four. The folio pieces not only include pieces from all the year's units, but also a personal negotiated piece which the students craft, edit, and refine as they learn new skills and techniques across the different units studied in the course.

One of the great joys of Creative Writing is watching the confidence of students develop over the year. How truly wonderful it is to see a student who came into the class in the first lesson saying 'I chose this class because it sounded interesting, but I'm not really good at English or writing' huddled over their notebook, seek feedback from their peers, and then present a crafted piece of writing which they are proud of, and which expresses their own unique view of the world. This development of a personal voice through writing is a key aim and focus of the course, and in 2021, the students in Creative Writing are making their voices heard.

We Are Responsible – Care for Our Common Home

This term, our College Expectation focus is 'We are Responsible.' Each Kinder – Year 6 class will spend time unpacking this expectation and look at the ways that students can develop their responsibility in different areas of their schooling.

A particular area that we are focusing on is being responsible for our environment. This is inspired by Laudato Si; a letter written by our Pope which is addressed to every person on the planet, asking us all to protect the earth and show care for our common home. Pope Francis urges us to make urgent changes to our lifestyles and how we consume energy in order to protect the planet.

Each Kinder – Year 6 Class has been challenged to make a difference in their classroom. Later in the term, classes will have the opportunity to share back at Assembly how they are showing care for our common home.

Some examples of changes that are already happening in our classrooms and around the grounds to show care for our common home include:

- **A New Food Scrap Bin** - This is located under the sail for students to place all their food scraps to go to compost, worm farms and for use in Animal Husbandry. Classes also collect their food scraps to place into the larger bin.

- **Classroom Recycling** – A number of classes are separating their waste so that soft plastics can be recycled. This is to reduce waste going into landfill.

- **Waste Audit** – Year 3 have conducted a Waste Audit to see exactly how much a class puts into waste each week and how this can be improved.


- **Turning Off the Lights** – Many classes turn the lights off when they head out for breaks, or enjoy the natural light at different times of the day.

- **Waste Free Lunches** – Students are encouraged to have waste free lunches, but also encouraged to take recyclable items in their lunch boxes home.

- **Picking up Rubbish** – Students are encouraged to not step over rubbish in the playground! Pick it up and put it in the bin.

We look forward to hearing from our students later this term about the small changes they are making that make a BIG difference to our environment.

There are three wines from which to choose: Pinot Gris, Pinot Noir and a sparkling Pinot Noir Chardonnay.


The wines are available by single bottles, discounted in dozens and in a special three-pack containing one of each wine.


Profits from these sales will go to the Dominic College Br Peter Dezani Scholarship Fund, which the DOSA Committee is building to make future scholarships possible.


