A New Tradition



NAMING OF SPACES & PLACES 2022

Naming of Spaces and Places Commencing in 2022

The naming of our facilities has been aligned with College traditions, symbols and a commitment to learn about the lives of our saints and those who have been seen as guides to holiness in the past.

It is also aligned with use of palawa kani, the language of Tasmanian Aborigines, to celebrate one of the world's oldest existing cultures, belonging to our First Nation Peoples and continued despite invasion and genocide.

Over a number of years, since 2015, several consultations have taken place with the College staff, particularly the K-6 and 7-10 teaching staff regarding their perspectives on preferred and suggested names. The College Leadership Team and Board have now approved our Naming Framework.

In 2022 we will be referring to the three precincts in the school that represent three distinct learning communities and although unified, are indeed physically distinct.

The pulana Precinct

The new K-2 Precinct will be called the pulana Precinct. In keeping with the names of our K-2 classrooms, we have gained generous permission from the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre to use palawa kani, the language of Tasmanian Aborigines to have an overarching palawa kani name for the precinct. pulana means star. The star is one of the key symbols within the College tradition – it is highlighted on the College Crest and the tie of our formal uniform.

The star is a sacred and spiritual symbol for many faiths traditions. In Christianity, the star is symbolic of divine guidance and protection. The star of Bethlehem represents God's guidance, and the star of David is a powerful symbol of protection in Judaism. The star is part of the Salesian coat of arms and the Dominican coat of arms.

The Prouille Precinct

The Year 3-6 Precinct will be called the Prouille Precinct. The Prouille Precinct is named after the first monastery for women that our patron, St Dominic Guzman established in the 13th century in France. It is considered the birthplace of the Order of Preachers. When the Dominican Sisters came to Glenorchy in 1956, they brought with them centuries of monastic tradition. The amalgamation of the Dominicans' Holy Name Convent and the Salesians' Savio College in 1973 to create Dominic College, created a joint tradition.

The Prouille convent, near the city of Toulouse has a huge history, and although destroyed and rebuilt, it continues today as a monastery that is home to an international community of Dominican Sisters. It is a place of pilgrimage and prayer.

The Valdocco Precinct


The Year 7-10 Precinct will be called the Valdocco Precinct. Valdocco is the neighbourhood in the city of Turin in northern Italy where St John Bosco, the founder of the Salesians established his first community and school for boys in the 19th century.

The oratory developed over a period of time to include a youth centre, school, workshops for various trades and boarding facilities. Valdocco continues today as the Headquarters of the Salesians and a school continues on site. It is considered to be the birthplace of the Salesians and is a place of pilgrimage.

TEACHING & LEARNING



High Expectations

'There's a lot of intelligence out there being wasted by underestimating students' potential to develop.'

— Marva Collins

Children achieve better outcomes when they are expected to succeed. At Dominic College we have an explicit focus on high expectations for every child as part of our Pedagogical Framework. This reflects our commitment as professionals in supporting each child's individual learning trajectory. Unsurprisingly, teacher expectations have a massive impact on student outcomes.

The Cambridge Dictionary defines expectation as, 'the feeling or belief that something will or should happen'. Applying this to the classroom context, having high expectations of students would therefore comprise the belief that students can and will learn. A teacher with high expectations holds the belief that every student can reach the next stage of their learning, so long as we provide the support that our students need. A teacher who has high expectations assumes competence & teaches up. Time is spent figuring out what the student needs to progress rather than making excuses and focusing on everything that the student cannot (yet) do.

In his meta-analyses of the effect sizes of various factors impacting student achievement, John Hattie found that 'teachers' beliefs and commitments are the greatest influence on student achievement over which we have some control'" (Hattie, 2008, p.25). Research demonstrates that students live up (or down) to our expectations. When we expect our students can learn and will succeed- they do. When we have low expectations... well, unfortunately they meet those as well.

What it comes down to is, a teacher who believes that their students can learn is going to set up the learning environment to ensure success. They set ambitious goals for their students and present engaging yet challenging material. They will ensure their students have multiple opportunities to practise and apply a new skill. Nothing stifles learning more than the belief that a child cannot learn something.

Having high expectations does not mean holding the same expectations for every student. Rather, it is having the expectation that every student in your classroom can and will reach their full potential. I personally have learned to assume that all my students are capable of learning anything so long as I am teaching it in a way they can access the content... and this is where differentiated teaching comes into play. We need to meet our students where they are now to get them to the next stage of their learning... and this is different for each student in your classroom, by ensuring all students are engaged, challenged and learning successfully.

At Dominic College however, high expectations are not just for teachers. Students play an essential role in their own learning by being actively involved in the learning process, taking positive risks and being curious.



Success in Maths Exams

As exams are approaching fast for Year 9 and 10 students and thorough revision is the key to success in Maths, I am sharing some good revision tips for Maths.

1. Plan exactly when you are going to revise which topic, and be strict with your schedule. Revising in small chunks is likely to be much more focused and effective.
2. Don't just read through the textbook! Do some workings in your books. The only way to revise maths is to do maths. This will increase your confidence and you will do better in the exam.
3. Don't just practice the topics you can do. Although it can be painful, work your way through the topics that you struggle with. It is much better to practice them, when you have time on your side and the answers available.



4. Make sure you ask for help. If you are stuck on a topic or a question, then ask your friend from your class, or your teacher.
5. Practice doing questions under exam conditions, with no help, for a fixed amount of time and showing full workings. This will get you used to what it will be like in the exam and how fast you need to go.
6. Practice using your calculator! Use your calculator for lots of different types of questions (Trigonometry, Pythagoras, negative numbers, indices) to prepare well.
7. If it works for you, try revising with a friend for a bit of the time. Just by explaining things to a friend, you will find that your understanding will increase.

I hope these tips will help you to prepare well. Good luck to year 9 and 10 students!!
