Naming of Spaces and Places K-2 in 2022

In last week's Newsletter I began sharing about the naming of our facilities and how this has been aligned with College traditions and guides to holiness in the past. It is also aligned with the use of palawa kani, the language of Tasmanian Aborigines, to celebrate one of the world's oldest existing cultures, belonging to our First Nation Peoples.



Tasmanian Aborigines have been reviving language since the early 1990s. palawa kani is not exactly the same as languages that were spoken before invasion – but all languages change over time. One difference is that before invasion a number of Aboriginal languages were spoken, while now, Tasmanian Aborigines speak one Aboriginal language – palawa kani. This is a composite language – that is, a mix of most of the original languages of lutruwita (Tasmania).

Under the language policy and protocols of the Tasmanian Aboriginal Centre we have been granted permission to name our four cohorts in our Early Years using palawa kani:

- Kindergarten tuminana (little fairy penguin)
- Prep larila (platypus)
- Year 1 timita (possum)
- Year 2 tuti (sand crab)

We look forward to all of our K-2 classes enjoying their class names, learning about their class animals and using palawa kani.


YEAR 9 - MARIA ISLAND CAMP

On the last week of Term 3 all Year 9 students headed off to the picturesque Maria Island. The students had the opportunity to discover the wildlife and history of the island while staying in a heritage listed convict penitentiary. The emphasis of the camp was to further student learning in three subject areas; HPE, History and Science.

Students were involved in presentations lead by the Tasmanian Parks and Wildlife Service around Indigenous and Colonial history and how the island has been a haven for various fauna over the years. One of the highlights was the opportunity to complete the famous Bishop and Clerk Walk to the summit.

'We participated in many activities such as a history walk where we learned about the aboriginal history of the island as well as looking at the old ruins. Our Science assignment tied into the learning about certain animals on the island as well as a beach clean-up. TEACHING & LEARNING



High Expectations

Last week Mrs Doyle wrote about the importance of teachers having high expectations of their students. As teachers and parents are partners in educating children, it will come as no surprise then that parental expectations also play an essential role in ensuring the academic success of a child.

As parents we are not only responsible for our child's physical wellbeing, providing clothing, food and shelter but also for helping them develop their beliefs and attitudes. Parental beliefs and attitudes are contagious. Our children take on our goals, values and expectations.

Studies over the years have looked at the critical link between parental expectations and academic achievement. These studies found that students whose parents held high expectations received higher grades, achieved higher scores on standardised tests, and persisted longer in school than students whose parents held relatively low expectations. High parental expectations are also linked to student motivation to achieve in school, academic and social resilience, and to their aspirations to continue to tertiary study.

If our expectations and goals are high, our children will want to strive to do their best. If we don't expect them to work hard, complete set tasks or hand in their work on time they may not even try to succeed. Our children live up to what we as parents expect. Ensuring we have a positive mindset can influence both how our children feel about school and also their ambitions for life.

Don't Aim Too Low

A recently conducted survey showed that parents risk condemning their children to a life of underachievement if they underestimated how much their children were actually supposed to know. This study focused on children's early learning. Of those interviewed, 47% believed that at age two-and-a-half, a child's vocabulary would be 100 words or fewer. In reality, it's closer to six times that

size! Expectations set too low can prevent your child from achieving their full potential.

Don't Aim Too High

Another study looked at the impact of parental over-aspiration on student outcomes by analysing a large sample from Germany and the United States. The study found that expectations set too high can also be detrimental to children's performance. The key in setting realistic goals lies in knowing your child. Don't get caught up in unnecessary and harmful comparisons. Being present and keeping track of your child's abilities can help you determine how best to help them progress.

Be Intentional

You don't lose weight by saying, 'I want to lose weight.' You lose weight by having a specific goal, 'I want to lose 5kgs', and then adopting specific habits to combat the problem. You get to your objective by focusing on the 'how'. The same applies to setting expectations for your child. It won't work to say, 'I expect you to read fluently.' You have to focus on the 'how' - help them to develop small daily habits like reading every day for 20 minutes, establish a family read-aloud tradition or read a book together.

Be a Model

As parents we need to 'walk the walk' as well as 'talk the talk'. Children are great at spotting falsehoods. We need to be prepared to model what being a learner looks like. We need to be willing to try new things and share our experiences of learning in a positive way. We must communicate to our children that school is an exciting place to be and that learning really matters. You can help your child achieve this by finding the positives in your child's day - What was the most interesting thing you learnt today? Or better still what were the two or three most interesting things you learnt today?

Your expectations matter.

Digital Technology

Digital Technologies and the Pedagogical Framework

A pillar of the Dominic College Pedagogical Framework is Connected Learning which involves providing opportunities for authentic, thoughtful teaching and learning in real-life contexts. Authentic learning is designed to connect what students are taught to real-world issues, problems and contexts.

Digital Technologies and the Australian Curriculum

We are always looking for ways to provide real-life learning opportunities for our students. This helps students see how skills in Digital Technologies are applied in real world contexts. The Australian Curriculum describes Digital Technologies as a subject in which students use computational thinking and information systems to define, design and implement digital solutions.

Digital Technologies at Dominic College

Year 7 Digital Technologies students have been using python programming skills to create food ordering systems using a range of programming functions including 'while loops' and 'if statements'. They have prompted user input and stored values as variables.

Students in Year 8 worked in groups to design and create a digital solution that responded to one of the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals. They designed algorithms and used Microbits to create their solutions, presenting their final solution to the class. Their solutions included: interactive quizzes to educate others, Basketball scoring systems, and step-counters to improve fitness.

Year 9 Information Technology students are working on authentic learning projects designing web sites to be hosted on our Learning Management System (SEQTA) for students, staff and parents to view. These projects are for key events at the College: Mental Health Week, Asian Festival and the

75th Anniversary celebration. Oscar McGann developed the first website to support Mental Health week. He showed dedication and commitment to solve problems and produce a very informative site with schedules of events and useful links. We look forward to seeing websites for the other events coming up.

Year 9 and 10 Robotics and Game Making students are getting into Game Making using industry Game Making software called Unity. They are making 2D and 3D games and look forward to testing their games when they are finished.

Last Term we took delivery of two Oculus Virtual Reality Headsets. Br Barry Parker, teacher of the Robotics and Game Making class, has been spending his spare time creating a virtual reality game to test out these devices. The students are looking

Building Resilience in Times of Uncertainty

With the impact of the recent COVID-19 lockdown and restrictions your child may need some extra support to understand and cope with change and uncertainty. Emerging Minds a leading Centre for child mental health suggest the following to help your child.

Provide routine and a sense of control where possible:

- Providing a predictable routine assists children in times of uncertainty.
- Your child's emotions and behaviour are influenced by their daily routine, including ensuring adequate nutrition, sleep, exercise, play and learning.

Understand and normalise their experience:

- Knowing how your child is feeling, listen to your child, what feelings and thoughts are they expressing? Look at what is behind their behaviour, ask questions. Normalise that it is ok to have different feelings when we are managing change.
- Remind them of how people are working to keep everyone safe.

Talk about what's happening with them:

- Don't dismiss your child's feelings by saying 'don't worry' or 'everything is fine', when their experience both physically and emotionally may be telling them otherwise.
- Acknowledge and talk to your child in age appropriate way about the current situation.
- Reassurance that you are there to help support them. Explaining this in a calm and caring way can assist your child to feel safe and secure.

Help them to recognise and manage their emotions:

- Helping your child identify their emotions, when they are feeling worried, sad, disappointed or angry, can assist your child with self-regulation. The Zones of Regulation Visual is a useful tool to assist your child. <https://www.zonesofregulation.com/free-downloadable-handouts.html>

• Acknowledge their feelings and let them know that it is ok to feel this way but use this as a way to build resilience. That you will be there to support them and focusing on the future of when the pandemic passes and the positive things.

Mr Paul Curtain, Dominic College Old Scholar, Class of 1970, is our special guest speaker this year.

Paul Curtain has been a fierce advocate for community sports and participation. He was a boarder at Savio College from Year 7, 1967 through Year 12, 1972, a good student, keen sportsman, friend of the Salesians and a legend of Old Scholar Cricket and Football.
