These families have shown great respect for Public Health authorities' directives and patience in the circumstances. We look forward to welcoming them back onsite next week.

Reflection of Semester 1 Student Progress

The term has generally commenced well. I was very pleased with the patterns of academic commitment and achievement by students K-10 reflected in both the grades achieved and the comments written by teachers for Semester 1 progress reports. Our students are doing well.

Students have been reported as:

- developing more confidence in sharing their views in class;
- using editing techniques more consistently with their written work;
- devoting more time to assessment tasks outside of school time.

Generally, across the College, revision for quizzes and tests needs to be given higher priority on the two weekends prior to the quiz or test date. Students need to increase the amount of time being devoted to test preparation.

Postponement of our 75th Anniversary of the Arrival of the Salesians of Don Bosco

With Victoria, NSW and South Australia, currently facing COVID-19 restrictions and the very volatile situation regarding interstate travel and quarantine restrictions, we are postponing our 75th Anniversary Celebrations at Dominic College planned for August.

FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL



Dear Families,

Welcome back to Term 3, I hope that our students had a great break. With border restrictions starting to take effect by the end of last term for Tasmania, a holiday at home certainly offered time for families to relax, renew and explore our wonderful state. Students, along with teachers have returned refreshed and ready for some great learning experiences.

Update to COVID-19 Safety Plan

Due to the recent changes in Government COVID-19 guidelines, our COVID-19 Safety Plan has now been updated. The main changes affecting parents and carers are as follows.

Collection of Details: We are now also required to use the Check in TAS app for any adult who enters a school building. So, if you are entering a classroom to speak to a teacher or collect your child, or you a visiting College administration then you will need to ensure that you check in using the Check in TAS app.

The College's normal sign in procedures for parents and carers remaining on site for visiting, volunteering, or meetings is still to be used, in addition to using the Check in TAS app and our site specific QR code.

Parents and carers when dropping off or collecting a child from the College and who do not enter a school building are exempt from the check in requirement. However, we will be placing additional QR codes in areas where parents like to congregate during drop off and pick up times and encourage them to sign in if they are planning on being on the College's grounds for more than 10 minutes (this does not include parents and carers who remain in their car).



Regional or state-wide lockdown planning: Public Health have in place plans for the application of a short, sharp lockdown to act as a circuit breaker on transmission and to support contact tracing should COVID-19 transmission be detected in the community.

Such a lockdown may be applied to a regional area only and possibly be accompanied by restrictions placed on the movement of people into and out of the area in lockdown.

Should our College be within a lockdown area we would be required to undertake the following:

- K-10 schools are defined as essential, and therefore we will continue to be open for children who need to attend.

- Face masks (disposable masks or re-useable cloth masks) will be required to be worn by staff and students over 12 years of age including all students in Year 6 (due to the co-location to the Year 7 students and the mixed ages in the one class) when attending school. Primary school students in Years K-5 are exempt from the face mask requirement. It should be noted that it is expected that students will supply their own masks.

Parents and carers are also reminded to continue to follow the requirements listed below.

COVID-19 testing, quarantine, and self-isolation: Parents and carers should contact the College administration for advice if they have any questions in relation to attendance onsite by either their child or themselves due to COVID-19 testing, quarantine, or self-isolation requirements.


Colds and flu: Parents, carers, and students should not attend school if they feel unwell with cold or flu-like symptoms including:

- fever
- cough, sore/itchy throat
- runny nose
- shortness of breath

Cleaning and hygiene: Parents, carers, and students must continue to take personal responsibility for hand hygiene. Of all the COVID-19 cleaning measures hand hygiene is the most effective.

Physical distancing: It is a paramount requirement for all parents and carers to strive to adhere, where practicable, to physical distancing requirements.

TEACHING & LEARNING



Pedagogical Framework

In 2019, the K-10 Teaching and Learning Team worked with Yvana Jones on shaping the Pedagogical Framework. Yvana is an educational consultant from Queensland who has been working regularly with our teachers over several years on developing best practice around 'high impact' teaching. The College's Pedagogical Framework is a significant development in our commitment to best practice and overall school improvement. It is informed by contemporary educational research.

Why is a framework needed?

The Pedagogical Framework offers a set of guidelines that represent a shared understanding of effective teaching and engaged learning. It provides a platform to inform reflections on teaching practice, opportunities for professional learning, and the collaborative design of meaningful and relevant learning experiences to support and enhance student engagement and learning.

What is pedagogy?

Pedagogy includes all activities, methods and strategies applied by teachers in the classroom to:

- Implement the curriculum
- Maximise student engagement with curriculum
- Ensure successful achievement of expected outcomes

The Design of the Framework

The K-10 Teaching and Learning team conceptualised the Framework around four key pillars:

HIGH EXPECTATIONS – *setting and achieving high expectations for teaching and learning.*

ACTIVE ENGAGEMENT – *ensuring high levels of teacher and student engagement in teaching and learning.*

CONNECTED LEARNING – *providing opportunities for authentic, thoughtful teaching and learning in real-life contexts.*

HIGH IMPACT TEACHING – *selecting teaching practices that reliably increase student learning.*

These are underpinned by Positive Relationships which is the foundation stone to the framework and strongly supports the Salesian educational philosophy.

Throughout the development of the framework our teachers provided input to the inform each of the pillars. At each stage of the development of the framework their feedback was considered, and adjustments made to further refine the framework. This year a final draft was presented to the College's Parents and Friends, the College Leadership Team and the College Board who have now approved and endorsed the Pedagogical Framework.

Dominic College Teacher Use of the Pedagogical Framework


Teachers have been engaging with the draft document since the beginning of 2021 and it has been the focus of the work at several K-10 Teacher Meetings where teachers have been given time and space to explore the pillars more deeply and collaborate on how best practice pedagogies can be implemented in the classroom.

Each pillar lists the key strategies for teachers to implement and what it looks like for students, providing clarity around what evidence teachers should see in the way students engage with learning. It is all about making a difference for students and their outcomes.

The College's Quality Teacher program of Classroom Observations by teacher, peers, and supervisors, now focus on aspects of the pillars and principles of the Framework for teacher reflection and feedback.

Electrifying Energy!

This term the **'bright sparks'** in 6C, are exploring Physical Science. Students will be looking at electrical energy and learning about all the ways it can be transferred and transformed. Through hands-on experiences, they will work together to create circuits and explore how energy can be generated from a range of sources both renewable and non-renewable.

To **'ignite'** student interest in this unit, Hydro Tasmania came in to talk to the Year 6 classes about how energy in Tasmania has changed over the last 100 years and how Hydro creates the energy we use today.


Students experienced static electricity and discovered that they could make a human circuit using the electrical energy that is running through them all the time. They then became engineers, designing and constructing turbines that had to be freestanding and spin under water pressure.

Year 7-10 Religious Education

A new term brings new units of study for Year 7-10 Religious Education students!


Towards the end of last term, Year 7 students received their first Bible in their Year 7 Bible Liturgy. They have learned how to use the Bible and why it is an important sacred text for Christians. This term, students will delve deeper into the Scriptures, by communicating an overview of the themes, people and events of the Old Testament.

Students in Year 8 studied the Jewish background and context of Jesus Christ at the beginning of the year. This term, students will apply this knowledge and understanding as they explore the Influence of Jesus in the Gospels. They will be introduced to the importance of parables and teachings Jesus used to provide a model for living. Students will analyse the actions of Jesus in the Gospels and the influence on people he encountered as well as for people today.

Year 9 students will study the background, history and principles of Catholic Social Teaching. They will develop an understanding of the importance of papal encyclicals, with a particular focus on Pope Francis' Laudato Si. Students will explore the issues of concern for Our Common Home raised in Laudato Si and they will investigate the Catholic Social Teachings and responses to these issues.

Year 10 students will explore how our personal moral code develops and is informed by life experience. They will explore the Catholic teachings about the development of our conscience that assists us to judge between right and wrong and helps us to make moral decisions. In class students will investigate multiple issues and apply the process a Catholic person would use to develop an informed conscience to take a stance or position on these issues.

Dear Parents,

This term we will be having Mental Health Week. This will focus on the health and wellbeing of our students. We hope to have a sleep expert for the whole school and there will be activities across K-10. The sleep expert is Professor Sarah Blunden. We are hoping she will be able to join us from Adelaide, but if not, there will still be a focus

on sleep for some year groups. There will be a parent session if COVID-19 restrictions do not hamper Professor Blunden's visit. More information will be forthcoming nearer the time. There will be activities at lunchtime that the School and House Captains will be running. In K-6 there will be activities at lunchtime, healthy food and Bravehearts. 7-10 will have a focus on healthy relationships, mental health, healthy food and R U OK activities. Students and staff will all be involved.

This is a good opportunity to check in with yourself and your student/s and see how your Wellbeing and health are going. Wellbeing is a mix of happy relationships, enough sleep, healthy eating and regular exercise, a sense of belonging, social and emotional wellbeing. There may be something you may feel you can be working on such as going for a walk or not eating that second biscuit. Sleep plays a vital role in a child's wellbeing. Do they have a good sleep routine? Are there devices on in their room as they sleep? Sleep patterns will change through a child's growth, and this is in part due to their hormone levels as they grow. If children don't get enough sleep this can affect their capacity to learn, they can be emotionally challenged, exhibit poor behaviour and they are less likely to engage in physical activity. All really good reasons to help our students have a great sleep routine.

Scholastic Book Fair 9–20 August


The 2021 Scholastic Book Fair will run in the K-6 Library from 9-20 August.
