


From the Principal

Semester 1 Academic Reports



Over the term break I had the pleasure of reading all student progress reports for Semester 1. I was extremely pleased with the commitment of students to their academic studies and the excellent growth shown in student expectation reports. One area of focus that did come across many reports was that better organisation will lead to better engagement and achievement. One way to achieve this is to use

the College Diary as tool for organisational purposes. One strategy that I have found to be helpful is when students list all the subjects they have each day and write whether or not they have homework into their diary at the end of each lesson. When they come home that afternoon, they can first finish off the homework, then work on assessment tasks or do some private study if they don't have much homework. Students are reminded that when they receive a Common Assessment Task, they should immediately write the due date into their diary and then schedule some time each week before it is due to work on the task. This will reduce the likelihood of leaving assignments to the last minute and gives parents and teachers an indication of how each student is organising their learning.

I wish all students well as they continue to set goals for Semester 2 and strive to challenge themselves across all areas and subjects.

Involvement in Co-Curricular Life

This is a great opportunity for all students to take part in a cocurricular activity for Semester 2. Whether it means joining a sporting team, debating team, art or drama club, there are many experiences on offer. It is a great way to meet new friends with similar interests and to build confidence and skills for individual growth. Getting involved shows commitment to your community and helps you to have fun and experience a range of new life skills that will benefit you in the future.

Pastoral Care News 7-10

E-cigarettes (or 'vapes') are lithium-battery powered, handheld smoking devices, and their use is on the rise amongst young people worldwide. The liquids in vapes typically contain nicotine, artificial flavours and a wide range of chemicals, which when heated into an aerosol and inhaled, forms a cloud of vapour when breathed out. The chemicals in vapes can be unsafe to inhale, and can cause such health issues as nausea, vomiting, chest pain, heart palpitations and irreversible lung damage. Many e-cigarette products lack proper testing, and despite claiming to be free of nicotine, often still contain it.

The sale of nicotine-containing vapes is illegal without a prescription, as is the sale of e-cigarettes to minors. Despite this, vapes are often easily accessible to and affordable for young people through online and social media channels, which poses additional dangers to their safety. E-cigarettes are attractive to young people as they often contain fruity or sweet artificial flavours, and are also marketed through online channels to seem glamorous and 'cool'.

Dominic College has a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to students possessing, using and selling vapes, and serious consequences are put in place for students who are found to be doing the wrong thing. The College is working on educating students around the dangers and risks of vaping through our HPE and Empower classes.

When talking with young people about vaping, it is important to speak about facts, avoid overreacting and be sure to show that you care about their health wellbeing in a non-judgemental way. Another good way to assist is to help young people make their own informed decisions about vaping by providing them with facts and information about the dangers and potential consequences of using e-cigarettes.

Teaching and Learning K-10

Early next term Parent Teacher Interviews will be held for students from Kinder through to Year 10. As teachers we welcome this opportunity to share and celebrate your child's strengths and to work in partnership with you to develop plans to ensure their continued growth.

Research shows that two of the most important factors that

influence a child's achievement at school are strong parental involvement and the development of a close link between home and school. At Dominic we firmly believe that this link is essential for ensuring the best possible outcome for each of our students. We encourage every parent to take the opportunity to meet with their child's teacher(s) even if an interview has not been requested.

This guide may offer you some tips in preparing for the interview.

Before the Interview

- Talk to your child about how they feel about school and their learning. Find out what they think their greatest success has been so far this year. What do they feel is an area that they need to continue to work on and develop? Is there something that they are concerned or worried about? Is there anything they would like you to discuss with their teacher/s?
- Look back over your child's report and school work. Make notes about any questions that you or your child have based on these.

During the interview

Possible topics to discuss might include -

- classroom routines or procedures that you would like to know more about
- information that will help the teacher understand your child better. This might include anything that is happening at home that could affect your child's behaviour, learning, or participation in class.

Possible questions you could ask might include -

- What skills does my child need to master?
- What are my child's academic talents?
- What are my child's strengths and weaknesses?
- How does my child get along with classmates?
- Is my child working to his/her ability? In which areas could he/she improve?
- How can I help my child?
- What can we do at home to support what you are doing in the classroom?
- How much time should my child spend on homework?

After the Interview

If your child was not at the Parent Teacher Interview take some time to sit with them and talk about what was discussed. Share their successes and enjoy talking about their strengths. Work with them to develop and implement any actions that the teacher has suggested that will help improve their academic growth.

Information on how to make a booking with your child's teacher(s) will be available on the school website early in Term 3. We look forward to working with you to ensure the best possible outcomes for your child.

Dominic Old Scholar Focus: Harry Breslin (Class of 2020)

As the Year 8 and 9 students make their choices about elective subjects for 2023 this week, we interviewed Old Scholar, Harry Breslin, about his continued passion for his Japanese learning.

What is it that you enjoy most about learning Japanese?

I enjoy being able to build up my vocabulary and language skills over time and seeing how much I've improved by having conversations with people.

Is this the same as when you were at Dominic, or has it changed as time has gone by?

The kind of things I learn and the way I learn them are similar, but the academic environment is more difficult and stressful.

Can you please tell us about why you chose to study Japanese at GYC?

I really enjoyed Japanese at Dominic and I wanted to continue studying it at College, so in Year 11 I chose the level 3 Japanese subject at GYC. We had three classes a week and were expected to know all the hiragana and katakana, and also solidified our knowledge of kanji with weekly tests.


What can you share with Dominic College students about your experience with the HAP program?

With my knowledge from Japanese in Year 11 and previous years at Dominic I had the opportunity to take part in the 'High Achiever Program' at the University of Tasmania this year. The program allows College students to study university level courses alongside their regular classes. I have been doing the Japanese 2A and 2B units. They are taught via a mix of face-to-face tutorials at the Sandy Bay campus and online lectures. We have a great lecturer and it's been fun to mix with a range of people from different backgrounds at university, and to be able to improve my Japanese through conversation with the other students.

What are your plans for the future?

I'm not sure yet what I want to do after Year 12, but I know that I do want to keep learning and improving my Japanese.


