## Encountering the Word through Godly Play


Godly Play was originally created for students as a method of telling Bible stories. It was developed by Jerome Berryman as a way to connect students through play, with sacred stories, parables and liturgical lessons.

It is based on creating a sacred space in which to present the stories of our faith, wonder about them together, and then allow the children open-ended opportunities to explore their understandings in a familiar play based approach. Play is a natural way for children to investigate, create, role play, critique and construct meaning.

There are three main elements to story telling within Godly Play is telling of the story, the wonder, and exploring. For example, with the parable of the Good Shepherd, the students might wonder how the sheep felt as they followed the shepherd, or whether the sheep have names, or how it might feel to be part of a flock.

The teachers will begin to explore the Godly Play sets that have been created, familiarising themselves with the scripture stories and materials. Over the term, students will be introduced to these resources to encounter the religious language, experience hands-on involvement leading them to strengthen their relationship with God.

# TEACHING & LEARNING



## Active Engagement in Teaching and Learning

### Parent Teacher Interviews and Goal Review Meetings

These were held for Kinder to Year 10 were held over the week from Monday 26 April to Thursday 28 April. They were an opportunity for Parents and Carers to meet with teachers and discuss the Term 1 Expectations Report and review the goals that students had developed with their teachers during Term 1.

After having to hold interviews remotely in 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions, teachers and parents were glad to be able to meet face-to-face to have these important meetings. Bookings could be made throughout the day on Monday and then in the afternoons/evenings depending on teacher availability. We trust this provided flexibility for parents to find a suitable time to meet with their child's teacher.

We would like to thank parents and students for making the time to meet with teachers in this way. There was a positive vibe at the meetings as teachers, parents and students talked about learning progress and goals to aim for.

### Communicating with Teachers

If you were unable to book in for Parent Teacher Interviews/Goal Review Meetings parents are welcome to contact the teacher directly and find a suitable time to meet in the afternoon over the coming weeks. Teachers also welcome email communications as they are always ready to provide feedback about how the students are progressing and answer queries. The classroom teacher in K-6 and the Pastoral Teacher in 7-10 is the first point of contact for parents and we encourage continued and regular communication.

### Students and Active Engagement in Learning

Many students came with their parents for the interviews which is a valuable way to ensure the students are engaging in discussions around their progress and the way they are applying themselves to learning. At Dominic College we encourage students to take responsibility for their learning with the support of their teachers and parents and other significant adults in their lives.

One of the pillars of the Dominic College Pedagogical Framework is 'Active Engagement'. Student engagement in learning involves:

- participation in academic, social and extracurricular activities;
- developing a sense of belonging to school;
- investing in learning and being motivated to learn; and
- self-regulation which involves being aware of how they learn and how to respond to learning experiences.

Teachers provide students with support to actively engage in learning and provide students with a variety of learning experiences to guide them in actively learning. Teachers and students work together to develop a shared understanding of what active engagement looks like, feels like and sounds like.

This might be a great question to ask your child: ***What does active learning look like, feel like and sound like for you?***

# LEARNING IN FOCUS



## Beneath our Feet

Have you ever stopped to think what's beneath your feet? In Science Year 4B, we have been studying a unit called 'Beneath our Feet' which has allowed students to explore how Earth's

surface changes over time as a result of natural processes and human activity, through exploring rocks, soil and landscapes.

Using our school grounds, we have explored and describe features of soils and rocks and their uses and then conducted investigations into the factors that affect water erosion of soils.

The Year 4 students found many areas around the school where erosion has been occurring and looked at what is causing the erosion. They decided the main causes of erosion her at school were:


- Water – sprinklers and the rain.
- Animals – especially the rabbits.
- People not using the footpaths.
- Dry ground without coverings.

After looking at the causes, they brainstormed ways that these areas can be protected from Erosion including:

- Remind students to walk on the footpaths.
- Plant more grass, plants and trees to hold the soil in place.
- Not using the sprinklers in areas without grass.
- Making a barrier / garden bed around our large trees where the roots are exposed.

Finally the students have conducted an experiment to see which ground coverings are best for preventing soil erosion through water by observing and comparing the soil in the water run-off from different coverings.



Goalsetting is an important part for a student's success in school, it is what fuels determination through challenges which they face, and it gives a sense of fulfillment once the goal has been reached.

**Vale Mrs Sue Whyte (12 December 1948 – 15 April, 2021) – Former Dominic College Educator**

Sadly, Mrs Sue Whyte, former teacher at Dominic College passed away on 15 April, 2021 and her funeral was held in Victoria on 22 April.

Sue commenced at Dominic College in February 1992 and was appointed to teach Music in Years 7- 9 and Social Science in Year 7 as well as being a Pastoral Group Teacher. Subsequently she also held the role of 7-10 Humanities Coordinator from 2005 - 2009. Unfortunately, Sue reluctantly retired from teaching at Dominic in September 2010 due to ill health.

As a long serving and deeply dedicated member of the teacher staffing, Sue had gained the wide respect of students, families and colleagues.

She was well known for her intelligence, sense of humour, creativity and keeping her students engaged and the teaching material relevant and contemporary. She always held high expectations of students and was fierce and passionate in her determination to ensure all students succeeded.

Many Old Scholars and former colleagues and families will remember Sue's originally scripted and scored drama and music productions that were widely praised and legendary at the College.

For years, Sue supported and nurtured Dominic students in choirs, public speaking competitions, developing Mercury school pages and particularly nurtured students in Rotary's Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA).

Sue worked tirelessly and used every professional and personal resource to nurture the students in her care. Her effectiveness and success as a teacher are demonstrated in the rich lives and diverse achievements of her many former student, who remember her fondly.

One of my fondest memories of Sue was her leading an early K-10 teacher professional development workshop in February 2010 where she and her colleagues, Bree Crocker and Brett Scanlon explored through movement, drama and speech, a classic Tennyson poem with other staff. It was memorable for all of us in experiencing and understanding differentiation.

This week we re-dedicate The Eagle to a much-loved teacher who gave great joy to her students through music, poetry and literature:

## **THE EAGLE by Alfred Lord Tennyson**

*He clasps the crag with crooked hands*

*Close to the sun in lonely lands*

*Ringed by the azure world he stands*


*The wrinkled sea beneath him crawls*

## The Death of Mr Peter Quinn

Old Scholar, past parent, and former British Child Migrant to Boys' Town, Mr Peter Quinn, passed away on 8 April 2021 aged 79 years.

Peter was born in Ireland 4 October 1941. His mother gave him and his sister up to a British orphanage when they were very young. Together with 38 other boys, Peter was brought out to Boys' Town, Glenorchy, by Fr John Brennan SDB, the first Rector of Boys' Town, to begin a new life in 1952. The boys lived at the school, slept in a dormitory, now the Bosco classrooms, had their meals in the dining room, now the 7-10 Student Services office, were taught their lessons in classrooms, now the Siena classrooms, worshipped in the old Boy's Town Chapel, now Siena 2, and played cricket and football on the grounds.

The boys grew up at Boys' Town, forming special bonds with each other, strong bonds which many retained all their lives. Without family of their own in Australia, they became each other's family. One of Peter's friends, Terry Harvey, said *'The only family we knew were the mates we came to Australia with. Our adult lives were centred around each other, doing things together and also with our children who became our migrant family.'*

Peter left school for work in January 1957, becoming a sewing machine mechanic. He married and had two sons, twins, Jason and Patrick, who went to Dominic College.

They lived in Barossa Road and Peter stayed in this, his first home, all his life – this was his 'castle'. Peter became a member of the Glenorchy District Football Club in 1969 and gave 50 years of service in various capacities as a medical officer and as a highly-valued trainer. He was active in community service all his life.

Peter volunteered at Savio and Dominic College in a number of ways and was President of the Savio Old Scholars 1962-1964. In the 1980s and 1990s, when he learned he was not an orphan after all and he still had family from whom he had been separated, Peter was very upset he had been misled. He was able to search and travel to the UK and the USA and eventually reconnect with some of his family.

RIP Mr Peter Quinn.

## Japanese Children's Day

### Koinobori

Students in all three Year 6 classes worked together to create this beautiful koinobori. This large carp streamer will be displayed in the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens as part of Hobart City's Japanese Children's Day event. Children's Day in Japan is on 5 May (next Wednesday), but Hobart City will have a display of children's work on show from 1 May – 9 May in the Japanese Garden. We are told that Japanese food will also be available to purchase in the shop. Perhaps a family visit to the Botanical Gardens could be fitted into this weekend or next?

### Valued Character Traits

Students in Year 6 considered character traits that they thought were the most important for children to have and develop. Each student wrote these words in English and Japanese on scale-shaped fabric. The scales and the body of the koinobori were decorated by the students using their 'oya-yubi' (which directly translates as 'parent-finger' – in English it is known as a thumb!).

### Japanese Traditions

In Japan at this time of year, families display koinobori outside their homes, and often small replicas of samurai armor inside. The carp represent strength and resilience, courage and determination as they are known for swimming upstream, against the flow of the water. Parents make an extra effort to spend time with their children on Children's Day (which is a public holiday in Japan), doing an activity together that everyone in the family will enjoy.

The Year 6 students and I hope that you share many wonderful moments together as a family on and around Children's Day this year!




