K-6 Grandparent's Day

Our Key Primary Leaders and K-6 Teachers will be working on alternative ways for our students to showcase their learning and connect with their grandparents throughout the term.

COVID-19 Guidelines & Safety Plan - Collection of Details

Just a reminder that we are now also required to use the **Check in TAS** app for any adult who enters a school building. So, if you are entering a classroom to speak to a teacher or collect your child, or you are a visiting college administration then you will need to ensure that you check in using the **Check in TAS** app.

The College's normal sign in procedures for parents and carers remaining on site for visiting, volunteering, or meetings is still to be used, in addition to using the **Check in TAS** app and our site specific QR code.

Parents and carers when dropping off or collecting a child from the College and who do not enter a school building are exempt from the check in requirement. However, we will be placing additional QR codes in areas where parents like to congregate during drop off and pick up times and encourage them to sign in if they are planning on being on the College's grounds for more than ten minutes (this does not include parents and carers who remain in their car).

TEACHING & LEARNING



Connected Learning – Literacy: an Important and Transferable Lifelong Skill

Our Dominic College Pedagogical Framework includes Connected Learning as one of the four key pillars central to learning at our College.

Connected Learning makes links between previous and new educational experiences across the curriculum. Authentic Learning is designed to connect what students are taught to real-world issues, problems and contexts.

Connected, Authentic Teaching and Learning provides students with opportunities to address three core goals:

- acquiring important knowledge and skills;
- making meaning by developing conceptual understanding and skills across learning areas; and
- transferring learning across new and meaningful contexts and situations.

For teachers at Dominic College, Connected Learning includes the embedding of the **General Capabilities and Cross-Curriculum Priorities** across all teaching programs. One of these General Capabilities is **Literacy**, an important skill that can be taught through and transferred across all subject areas.

What is Literacy?

Literacy is a fundamental life skill. It is developed in multiple ways – through listening to, reading, viewing and creating language. First at home and then as part of their education, children learn to understand and use language effectively and confidently. This is essential for learning, communicating and participating in society. What are known as ‘texts’ are the various ways language is used – it can be written, spoken, visual, or a combination of these, and in print, digital or online forms. All of these forms show the diverse ways language is used to communicate in our world.

How is Literacy taught across the Curriculum K-10?

Through the course of their K-10 school education, students develop literacy capability as they understand and interpret a wide range of texts, and create their own spoken, written, visual and digital texts.

A good example of how literacy is dynamic and critical across the curriculum is **Health and Physical Education, where Kinder/Prep-age** students develop their word knowledge and use language to communicate effectively and interact positively with others as they work in groups or participate in team games.

In **Year 6 Science**, students develop word knowledge and an understanding of text structures to describe their observations during investigations.

They need to learn how to effectively communicate their findings in a variety of ways.

In **Year 8 English**, students learn to talk about and evaluate opinions and arguments about aspects of literary texts such as novels, films or magazine articles. They develop knowledge about text structure and grammar to state their opinions and points of view and continue to expand their word knowledge to communicate more effectively.

In **Year 10 Religious Education**, students engage with complex religious and theological texts to support their points of view and opinions about ethical and moral issues. They work collaboratively to unpack the advanced terminology to understand the meaning of complex words and statements.


How can families support the teaching of Literacy at home?

At home, you can help your child develop literacy capability by:

- playing games to develop knowledge and enjoyment of learning new words;
- sharing a wide variety of age-appropriate texts with your child, including books, novels, websites, newspaper, films and television programs;
- talking about favourite authors, directors and producers and why you like their work.

Through this continual engagement with texts at home and across subjects in school, students’ literacy capability is sure to thrive and they will be equipped to transfer this skill to tackle the challenges and requirements of their future studies and apply it to their future chosen career pathways.

Exploring Text Types

Year 1C lakri have been exploring a range of text types including recounts, narratives and poetry. Students enjoyed writing recounts about their holidays, their visit to Animal Husbandry and the Colour Fun Run.

When studying narratives, students were already familiar with many fairy tale stories but realised that there are different kinds of narratives such as mystery, picture books and short stories. Students created






their own narrative stories ensuring characters, setting, a problem and solution were included. Students planned each element, wrote their story, edited their writing and then published their good copy. They were extremely proud of their narratives they had created. Students shared their narratives with their Year 4 buddy class as well as with one another. It was wonderful to see students enthusiasm and creative minds throughout the writing process.

This term, Year 1 have been learning to read, write and listen to different kinds of poetry. Students have read limericks, rhyme, five senses, colour and acrostic poems. They used their name to write an acrostic poem, describing themselves using wonderful adjectives. Students have also written fantastic colour poems which involved using their senses to describe their chosen colour. Some of Year 1's favourite poems they have read are:

- 'Now We Are Six' by A.A. Milne
- 'Augustus Gloop' by Roald Dahl
- 'The Rowing Son' by Roald Dahl
- 'There was an Old Man with a Beard' by Edward Lear

Providing students with a range of different text types gives them the opportunity to learn the structure of texts, their purpose and how to use them. I look forward to watching Year 1C lakri increase their knowledge of text types even more throughout the remainder of the year!

With the conclusion of the Tasmanian Debating Union competition at the end of last term, it is with a great sense of pride that I look back on the accomplishments of the teams fielded by Dominic College in 2021.

Our Year 8 team – comprising of Annabelle Tolman, Jasmin Bailey, Elina Korenstra, and Priyannika Kumrai – were superb and unmatched in their dedication to honing and perfecting their skills. Each week, the team would plan, rehearse, and structure their arguments at great length, often selflessly giving up their lunchtimes to do so.

Our Year 9 team – comprising of Daniella Fehlberg, Pearl Swindells, Amy Charlton, and Amelia Davey – were all newcomers to debating, but nonetheless hit their stride and managed to score several resounding victories over much more experienced teams. They overcame nerves and anxiety and finished exceptionally well.

Our Year 10 team – comprising of Joshua Willson, Leo Harvey, Krisha Patel, and Talysha Blight – were similarly largely newcomers. Despite this, they managed to give it their best and prepared well and tackled experienced teams head-on.

Finally, our Year 5/6 team. A highlight of the competition for me was to watch the Year 5/6 team debate here at the College, and then to spend a lunchtime helping them prepare for their next debate. It was truly inspiring to see such young students engaging vigorously in the art of debating, and to watch how their minds worked in formulating their arguments – much more sophisticated than anything I could have conceived of when I was that age!

After watching them debate, several of the team approached me and asked ‘Mr. Glidden, can we still do debating when we get to the high school?’ to which I gave a (perhaps over enthusiastic) ‘Please do!’

Despite not winning recognised laurels of victory such as finals, championships, or trophies, our debaters this year are nonetheless all winners of much greater prizes, the sort of prizes which young people can carry with them for life: the prize of having overcome anxiety and fear, the prize of having developed excellent reasoning and speaking skills, the prize of self-direction and preparation, and above all, the prize of giving something their best shot and following through. They have much to be proud of, and much we, as fellow members of the Dominic College community, should be proud of them for.

Finally, I would be remiss to neglect to thank the adults involved in this year’s competition. Team coaches Ms Crawford, Ms Cunningham, Mr Lapolla, and Mr Fulton – four wonderful and dedicated teachers who gave willingly of their time to help coach and prepare our teams so that they could engage fully at each debate. And of course, a huge thanks to all the parents and guardians who supported the students every week – and ensured that they arrived at the venue on time!

It is my firm hope that 2021 will serve as a launching pad and that those students who sharpened their reasoning and speaking skills this year, will continue to use them to great effect in 2022.


Year 7 and 8 EMPOWER

Students have made a strong return to the College this term. As the new term begins we have started looking at new units of work in our EMPOWER programs. In particular, our Year 7s and 8s have been focusing on personal traits, including strengths and weaknesses.

Our Year 7 students have been concentrating on individual qualities and how they impact on the way they interact with each other. Students completed the VIA character strength survey which then ranks their 24 attributes and shows them how to work with their strengths to achieve strong outcomes and how to develop their weaknesses to further progress. Students were fascinated to discover that they possess character traits such as 'zest' and 'prudence' and that these all contribute to society in wonderful ways. As we continue through the course students will be encouraged to work with peers who have different strengths than their own and hopefully will be able to see how differences can collectively make us stronger.



Our Year 8 student have been looking at the value of a growth mindset. We have begun researching 'famous failures' and looking at the value of failing if we are prepared to learn from it. Students have enjoyed discovering that rejection, redirection and setbacks have been experienced by many successful people and that this has allowed for them to develop resilience and perspective. Students are also keeping an Olympic journal that is focusing on stories of perseverance, dedication and triumph over adversity. As the unit progresses we are hoping that students come to see that hard work and putting effort in, despite the risk of failure, are worthwhile.
