## Private Music Tuition at Dominic College for 2021

The benefits of studying Music in cognitive development is well documented and the Music tuition program at the College is supported. Research is consistently backing up what many music teachers are probably telling you, that is, learning a musical instrument or participating in band

at school has positive impacts on cognitive, social, and academic performance of young people. Participation in music is associated with higher scores in academic subjects, with strong correlations observed between learning an instrument and academic progress. Recent studies have also indicated that individuals who are musically trained demonstrate better working memory abilities than those who are not.

At Dominic College we offer private instrumental and vocal tuition to students from Prep - Year 10, at an additional cost to families. These lessons are conducted during school hours once a week, and will be timetabled during an agreed time between each student and their classroom teacher. We welcome back our highly skilled, experienced and dedicated team of music tutors who are all very much looking forward to working with our students.



# TEACHING & LEARNING



## K-10 Teaching and Learning

## High Impact Teaching

One area of focus for our Teachers and Learning Support Assistants is High Impact Teaching. Effective lessons are essential to the process of successful teaching and learning to:


- facilitate students thinking;
- encourage students to interact and ask questions;
- tap into their prior knowledge;
- build new understanding and skills.

Teachers will be tapping into the knowledge students have already gained and beginning to extend the students beyond what they already know. They will develop student confidence through practice and repetition. Students will collaborate as they learn together in the classroom.



## The Learning Pyramid

The Learning Pyramid is a valuable way to look at learning and is valuable for parents to be aware of as well. Parents, especially parents of our younger students, are highly involved in supporting learning. The top of the pyramid shows ways we learn passively and can result in less retention. The base of the pyramid are areas where students



are actively participating in learning. Discussion, practice and teaching others are the best methods of increasing retention.

It has been wonderful this week to see students actively engaging in their learning in a variety of ways. I trust parents are having great conversations with their children about what they have been learning and the experiences they have had in and out of the classroom this week.


**Student Summer Holiday Highlights**

THE busloads of international tourists haven't come this year, but a southern Tasmanian fruit farm has remained a hive of activity. Sorell Fruit Farm supervisor Alison Lynn said locals had been flocking to the farm to pick berries for Christmas.

"We are so grateful to everyone for their support they're really got behind us, that's so important," she said. "The farm is going really well, but of course we are without the international tourists this year, so it's a bit more relaxed."

Although a cold winter impacted crop pollination by limiting bee activity, there is still plenty of fruit to go around.

Sought-after pink cherries are available to be picked, along with traditional dark cherries.

White cherries are due to become ripe over the next week.

## Introduction to Hospitality (VET) Masterclass

We have a very enthusiastic group of fifteen students who have enrolled for the Introduction to Hospitality VET course under the guidance of Mr Cameron Golding. Today they had the wonderful opportunity of a masterclass with a Queensland based Chef, Lauren Kinne from Elska Restaurant in Brisbane. Lauren completed her initial qualifications achieving a Certificate I and II in Hospitality (Kitchen Operations) at GYC. After Year 12 she worked as an apprentice at Maldini and then the Glasshouse completing a Certificate III in Hospitality (Commercial Cookery). In 2016 Lauren was awarded the Tasmanian Hospitality Apprentice Chef of the Year Award having been nominated by her teachers at TasTafe (Drysdale).

In 2017, as a fully qualified Chef Lauren then embarked on a move to Brisbane in search of further experience in fine dining. She worked at Bucci, one of the ten best Italian restaurants in Brisbane. She was promoted to Sous Chef. Lauren then took up a position at Stokehouse Q at South Bank where she was managing sections and preparing Modern Australian cuisine. She has for the last year worked at Elska which offers diners a 14 course degustation over 2 hours. Lauren designs and creates many of the dishes using beautiful Australian produce and highlighting Nordic culinary techniques.


