Greetings all,

This week we celebrate two saints significant to us in our Church and College community – St Dominic Guzman and St Mary MacKillop.

In Australia we celebrate the feast of St Dominic Guzman on the third of August. St Dominic Guzman is one of the two 'Dominics' after whom our College is named and is one of the four patrons after whom our Houses are named. St Dominic Guzman died exactly 800 years ago, in 1221, and ever since then has been revered and remembered for his great dedication to preaching the Word of God. He devoted his life to breaking open the Word of God to people throughout southern Europe so that they could be formed in the message of Jesus, understand how it could influence their lives and learn to love God more deeply. He founded the religious congregations of both the Dominican Friars (men) and the Dominican Sisters (women) to continue his mission of being 'Preachers of the Word'.

The Dominican Sisters came to Glenorchy in 1959 to commence their wonderful ministry of education in St John's Primary School and Holy Name School. Dominic College was created from this heritage. We give honour to all the Dominican Sisters who have been part of this story and congratulate Sr Pam Davis and Sr Mary Rickards who remain active members of our parish and supporters of our Dominic College community.

The feast of St Mary MacKillop is held on the eighth of August, and Mary is the only Australian who has been official named as a saint by the Catholic Church. St Mary spent all her adult life as an educator and educational leader. She founded the religious congregation of the Sisters of St Joseph who have established hundreds of schools throughout Australia, with a particular focus on the rural and regional areas in our vast country. She is a great model of faith, determination and particular care for those on the 'peripheries' of our society that Pope Francis is calling us to care for.

May St Dominic Guzman and St Mary MacKillop intercede for us and inspire us.

TEACHING & LEARNING



Connected Learning

This week, whilst reading various articles about Connected Learning I have found there are theories, suggestions and ideas that all have a common theme: To understand Connected Learning and to create effective Connected Learning environments, we need to understand how learning happens. Knowledge is actively constructed by the individual through their interactions with each other and their environment.

I have found that 'we have moved from the information age, to the connected age, says President and CEO of Educause, Diana Oblinger (2013). The connected age is enabled by technology that is designed for user contribution – the systems which allow for 'the architecture of participation' (O'Reilly, 2004). In the connected age, where information resides is not important; it is the connection we can make to the information, and to each other, and the value of these connections that are vital (Oblinger, 2013).


This quote resonated with me, particularly when my thoughts turned to observing and identifying Connected Learning in the Early Years. Our students have had between 4 and 8 years to learn an amazing amount- how to walk, talk, feed themselves and care for their basic daily needs before they come into the formal learning environment of schools. The importance of connecting our classroom learning to our students' prior knowledge and experiences is vital for our students to make sense of the increasingly complex and sophisticated world they find themselves navigating.

The photo below shows the results of a recent lesson that was an introduction to measurement for Kinder tuminana. The following question was posed: 'What is measuring?' Thinking time allowed all students to remain as quiet as possible as all students had an opportunity to formulate their responses. Every initial response was recorded (in blue) as they tried to find an answer to the question. After a clam full of rice and various containers, jugs and spoons were introduced to our conversation, the student responses became more specific. These were recorded in green. Some of the responses were quite sophisticated: you have to have a ruler to measure; my medicine was measured in mls; measuring how old you are; measuring people so we know people's height- how big they are. These responses also highlighted the mathematical vocabulary the students already have, sometimes without fully understanding what it means. All of these responses are now springboards for us to take their understanding of measurement further through practical experimentation.

The responses indicate that each child was able to respond to the question using prior knowledge or connecting their current thinking with things they had experienced at home. In particular, the response 'the circle thing that has a measuring thing inside it' was later identified as the scales we use to weigh ourselves when a 'person's heaviness' was discussed. When looking at the responses I could also see that some were from experience, some from a functional view of tools used for measuring and some of things that could be measured i.e 'measuring the TV'- something that is often mentioned in advertising these days!. This concept map will be developed further to help Kinder tuminana to sort their thinking using those guidelines and make new connections as their understanding of some of the forms of measurement we use daily develops.

Interestingly, when we experienced our first Mamma Margaret Kitchen cooking lesson later in the week, instant connections were made to measuring temperature because the Foccacia rolls were too hot to eat when they came from the oven! In conclusion, a vital part of helping children develop the connections between prior and new learning is conversation- the words we use to explain how things work is essential for them to build their own vocabulary bank to begin to make even more connections between their experiences at home and at school. So yes, answering all of those what, how, and why questions are really important to your child's development and learning.

LEARNING IN FOCUS



Globalisation


Last Semester the Year 9 and 10 Geography class finished with an in-depth study of Globalisation. Students were asked to look both the benefits and deficits of living in a 'global village'. Whilst students were able to look at the benefits of technology and transport for individuals living in developed countries, they were also able to weigh up the impacts of globalisation on developing nations. The case study of Tuvalu, an island nation in the Pacific, highlighted that globalisation can have devastating impacts on the environment. Students should be proud of the way they problem solved and attempted to find ways to keep the benefits but

minimise the damage caused by globalisation.

This semester our Geographers have begun with a study of Human Wellbeing on a global scale. Students have been researching different indicators used to measure a country's wellbeing. Whilst discussing the various qualitative and quantitative data that we have available to us, we have been able to compare the value of virtue of respective data. In comparing the importance of countries' rate of cars on the road to access to clean water we have been able to reflect on the ways in which our happiness can be determined.

Students have compared these statistics to economic data and have discovered that whilst a level of financial security is needed to maintain a living standard, excessive wealth does not increase a country's happiness. In comparing Gross Domestic Product to the Happy Planet Index on an overlay map, students were able to see the relationship between freedom, healthcare, environmental stability and happiness and wellbeing.

All teachers were given a budget and an order form and were free to order a range of games to suit their particular age groups.


