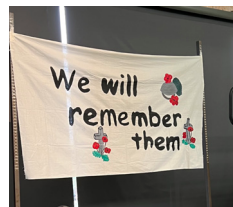


ANZAC Day Commemoration Assembly

ANZAC Day – 2022

What Is ANZAC Day?

ANZAC Day, on April 25 each year, is an Australian and New Zealand national day of remembrance for Australians and New Zealanders at



home and around the world. The day marks the anniversary of the first big military action by Australian and New Zealand soldiers in World War I on April 25, 1915.

What Does The Word ANZAC Mean?

ANZAC is the acronym formed from the first letters of the words Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. It was first written as 'A & NZ Army Corps', when Australian and New Zealand soldiers were grouped together in Egypt waiting to go to Gallipoli, in Turkey, to start fighting. The soldiers who fought at Gallipoli became known as ANZACs.

What is the ANZAC Legend?

The toughness and the bravery of the ANZACs became well known in Australia, New Zealand and around the world and helped give rise to what has become known as the 'ANZAC legend'. Sometimes talked about as meaning being hard working, tough, brave, fair and looking after your mates, the ANZAC legend is either something that defines us today, or that it is something we should remember, celebrate and aspire to.

ANZAC Day Ceremonies

During the term break, Dominic College was represented at many ANZAC Day ceremonies across Hobart. Students, families and staff were in attendance at the Hobart, Lenah Valley, Glenorchy, New Norfolk and Pontville services, with student leaders honoring those who sacrificed their lives, by laying a wreath at each service.

It is also important for students to remember to look after their mental and physical health during this time, by eating well, exercising, making time to do activities that they enjoy, and seeking support if they feel that they need it.

Another term full of opportunities for our students to learn and grow.

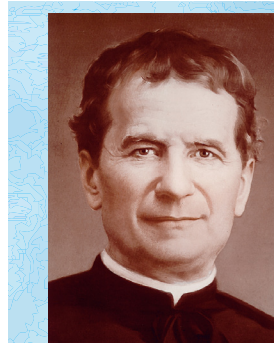

Aboriginal Studies

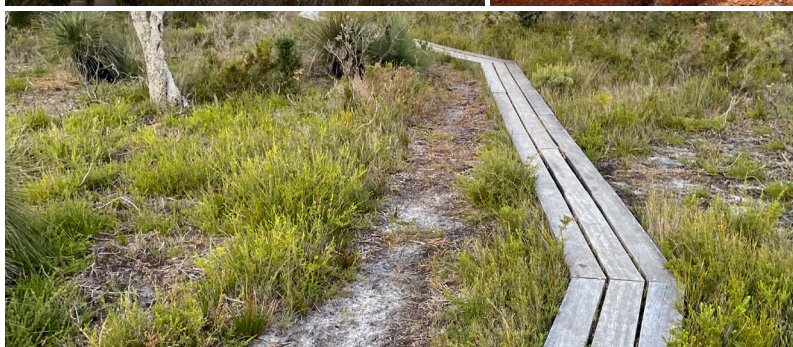
Country is the term often used by Aboriginal peoples to describe the lands, waterways and seas to which they are connected. The term contains complex ideas about law, place, custom, language, spiritual belief, cultural practice, material sustenance, family and identity.

nipaluna is the name of the country in which the city of Hobart sits. This was the name known by the Aboriginal people of the south east.

Acknowledging when you are on the land of Traditional Owners is a sign of respect which acknowledges Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ownership and custodianship of the land, their ancestors and traditions.

Over the holidays I had the privilege to deepen and expand my understanding of land and sea Country here in *lutruwita* (Tasmania) by hiking the *wukalina* Walk on *trulwulway* Country. Led by *palawa* guides, I learnt about past and present cultural activities, bush tucker and traditional foods. My experience was deepened by walking on Country, where I felt a welcome visitor to a living cultural landscape.

Teaching and Learning K-10

This week we held our annual Parent Teacher interviews for Term 2. It was great to see so many of our families come to listen and share the progress of their children. Increasing communication between home and school plays an important role in a school that aims to educate students for life beyond Dominic College.

With what you have learned at the Parent Teacher interviews and from your child's report, how can you continue to support their progress for the remainder of the year?

A 2007 study asked teenagers what would support their learning most. The answer may surprise you. It was not better technology or a new computer, not a room of their own to study in, nor a tutor! The thing that most teens said would help them was moral support from their parents.

Did you know that children who believe their parents think 'school is important' automatically do better in class?

As simplistic as it may sound in our modern world the single most important determiner of how well a child will achieve at school is the family environment. Effective teachers and quality schools like Dominic College can make a huge difference to how a child learns but, in her article, 'Parents Not Making the Grade' Kylie Lang quotes Doctor Janet Goodall from the University of Bath, 'We continue to act as though the only way to increase educational standards is to tinker with schools but what we need is greater parental engagement.'

In 1966, American sociologist James Coleman conducted a study of more than 650,000 students to understand educational equality. He found that student background and

home environment outweighed many other factors.

So how can you help? What can you do? It can start with simple things. Instead of asking 'How was your day?' try asking some of these more probing questions

What did you learn today?

What surprised you today? Why?

What's the most important thing you learned today? Why do you think that?

What do you want to learn more about what you did today? Why?

What made you most curious today?

When were you at your best today? Why?

What can you do with what you learnt today?

The students in the 2007 study said they didn't mind if their parents didn't understand the homework they were trying to do as long as their parents were supportive and encouraged them to attempt it. Having high aspirations and staying engaged with your child's learning is essential.

It might not always be easy but the research proves the essential role we have as parents.

Co-Curriculum

Debating

Insofar as co-curricular activities can develop skills in critical and creative thinking, innovation, public speaking, collaborative learning, and the ability to synthesize arguments into sharp, concise speeches, it is hard to go past Debating.

Debating as an activity allows students to develop and enhance all of these skills, and provides an authentic context for the practicing and refinement of many others.

Each year, the Tasmanian Debating Union (TDU) runs a competition for secondary and senior secondary students. Teams of three students compete once a fortnight against other schools as they debate a range of ideas both theoretical and practical.

Like so many other activities – co-curricular or otherwise – COVID-19 has impacted the 2022 competition after a relatively smooth run for 2021. Instead of the usual eight rounds, the 2022 fixture will only run for six, and instead of commencing in Term One and running until halfway through Term Two, the competition will commence on 18 May and conclude early in Term Three.

In 2021, Dominic College fielded three teams (in the Year 8, 9, and 10 divisions) and performed very well. Though none of our teams reached the finals, we can nonetheless be extremely proud of the way in which our students banded together and competed each week without complaint.

In 2022, it is wonderful to note that we are able to field teams across all secondary divisions. Students have been hard at work since Term One developing their skills in debating at the new Debating and Public Speaking club run fortnightly of a Wednesday afternoon, and are eager to put those skills into practice. Many of our debaters for 2022 have had a couple of years' experience. The Year 9 team have performed consistently well since Year 7, and our Year 7 team have been debating since Year 5. Our Year 10 team is made up of the same students who shone through in 2021 as Year 9s who had

never before participated in debates of any kind. My thanks go to Ms Katie Crawford for the way in which she has organised and run the Debating and Public Speaking Club. It has been an invaluable format for students to be exposed to what is involved in a formal debate and practice these skills in a more relaxed debate in which Ms Crawford can give immediate feedback to the students.

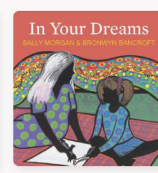
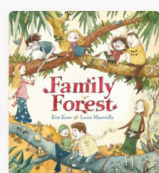
