## Engaging Classroom Experiences

There are some wonderful learning experiences occurring across our classrooms in Religious Education.

Students in Year 2A have been working together with their Year 5 buddies to create some symbolic Easter art. They used a variety of materials to depict Jesus as the light of the world by carefully drawing and cutting a black cross and using a variety of coloured paper. These have been displayed on the windows to illuminate the art.



This week Kinder timita, tuminana and larila celebrated their class Mass together in the Chapel. They focused on Jesus' resurrection and the messages of hope and joy as we look for new life. The students participated in creating a piece of artwork which was then displayed together as a class mural using the heading 'Jesus has risen' in bold, bright colours.



The Prep students have been reading the Parable 'The Good Shepherd'. They discussed the important messages in the passage such as, Jesus knowing each sheep by name just as he knows and calls us by name and being a protector of sheep, a shepherd to all.



In Year 2, students have been practising mindful meditation using Mandalas. A Mandala is a geometric design that holds a great deal of symbolism in Hindu and Buddhist cultures. They are believed to represent different aspects of the universe and are used as instruments of meditation and symbols of prayer.


It also marks the beginning of Holy Week, with the greatest tragedy and sorrow of the year.

## K-10 Term 1 Expectations Reports

Yesterday you would have received an email advising that the 2021 Term 1 Learning Expectations Progress Report is available to view on SEQTA Engage, the parent portal of our learning management system.

This report provides parents and carers with information about the attitude and application of students across every subject area. Academic progress has not been included on this report but will be included in the Term 2 Progress Report.

## Goal Setting and Review

During Term 1 students have engaged with their teachers in setting up to three goals to focus on this year. We now invite parents and students to engage in reviewing these goals with their teacher. For K-6 students Goal Review will be incorporated as part of the Parent Teacher Meeting and provides an opportunity to discuss how student can be supported in achieving their goals. 7-10 students have been allocated a Goal Review Teacher which appears on the report. Parents are asked to make a booking for a 10-minute Goal Review Meeting to review the goals their child has set with the teacher and discuss how they can be supported in achieving these goals.

## Parent Teacher Interviews

Following the Term 1 Expectations Report parents and students are invited to book in with their child's teacher(s) to discuss their attitude and application to learning at this point of the year.

## Booking Goal Review Meetings and Parent Teacher Interviews

**The meetings for Goal Review will be slightly different in 2021.** Teachers are available to meet with parents and students for Goal Review Meetings and Parent Teacher Interviews throughout the day on Monday 26 April OR in the afternoon/evening up to 7.00pm on Monday 26 April, Tuesday 27 April, Wednesday 28 April and Thursday 29 April depending on the availability of teachers.

Teachers will schedule available times for parents to choose in SOBS (Schools Online Booking System). Teachers have indicated on reports if a Parent Teacher Interview is requested, and we encourage all parents to meet with their child's teacher(s). Goal Review Meetings and Parent Teacher Interviews are an important way we partner together in the education of your child to support best educational outcomes.

We trust that offering flexibility of appointments across the week will support families in accessing this important opportunity to meet with teachers to discuss the Term 1 Report and Review Goals. **SOBS** will be **open** for bookings from **8am Friday 9 April** and **closes 12pm Friday 23 April**.

- Parents of Year 7 to Year 10 students should make a booking with the Goal Review Teacher and Subject teachers of their choice.
- Parents of Kinder to Year 6 students only need to make one booking of 10 mins to meet with their child's class teacher.

- Year 7- Year 10 interviews will be in the Savio Centre.
- Kinder to Year 4 interviews will be held in the College Library.
- Year 5 and Year 6 interviews will be held in the Year 6 classrooms (above the College Library).

Dominic staff will be on hand to meet you and direct you to the interview areas. Hand sanitising stations will be set up at each location and socially distanced seating in waiting areas. Please do not attend if you or your child are unwell and contact the teacher directly to inform them that you are unable to attend or contact the Business Office during business hours on 6274 6000.

# LEARNING IN FOCUS



## Humanities

This year, Dominic College has successfully introduced a Geography elective to its program. Students have begun the year by studying food scarcity, food security and the causes of food insecurity. Through the collection and analysis of data, students have been able to draw spatial associations between access to food and political violence, war, drought and technological advancements. Through their developing mapping skills and their increasing global perspective students have been able to

see that the barriers to food security are not just economic but can also be social, physical and environmental.

In looking at the causes of food insecurity we have also looked closely at solutions that can be implemented internationally, nationally, and locally. One core contributor to the uneven distribution of food globally is food wastage in the western world. Our geographers decided to audit the food waste at Dominic College by inspecting

all bins after lunch one day. They discovered that students throw away significant amounts of food and through their data collection have estimated that the total amount of food thrown away would cumulate to form over twenty new complete lunchboxes. Students were then challenged to create educational posters for the community to help educate them about food wastage and to campaign for alternatives to throwing out food. The students have done an amazing job and we look forward to seeing their campaigns around the school next term.

# PASTORAL CARE NEWS



## Zones of Regulation

As part of our EMPOWER program in Kinder to Year 6 we have been working with a program called 'The Zones of Regulation.'

This curriculum helps children better understand their emotions, sensory needs, and thinking. It encourages them to manage their emotions based on which

colour zone they're in. Additionally, The Zones of Regulation helps students recognise their own triggers, learn to read facial expressions, develop problem-solving skills, and become more attuned to how their actions affect other people. ### Goals of The ZONES Curriculum

- TEACHES STUDENTS:
- Identify their feelings and levels of alertness
  - Understand their feelings in context
  - Effective regulation tools
  - When and how to use tools
  - Problem solve positive solutions
  - Understand how their behaviors influence others' thoughts and feelings
- ...And ultimately move towards Independent Regulation

The Zones breaks our emotions into 4 basic colours – Blue, Red, Yellow and Green.

### The Green Zone

The green zone is used to describe when you're in a calm state of alertness.

Being in the green zone means you are calm, focused, happy, or ready to learn.

### The Yellow Zone

The yellow zone describes when you have a heightened sense of alertness, you might be excited, a bit silly, frustrated.

### The Red Zone

The red zone describes an extremely heightened state of intense emotions. When a person reaches the red zone, they may no longer be able to control their emotions or reactions.

### The Blue Zone

When you're in the blue zone you may be feeling down – sad, sick, tired, or bored. You're still in control, as you are in the yellow zone, but with low energy emotions.

The ZONES of Regulation®

'The Zones can be compared to traffic signs. When given a green light or in the Green Zone, one is 'good to go'. A yellow sign means be aware or take caution, which applies to the Yellow Zone. A red light or stop sign means stop, and when one is in the Red Zone this is often the case. The Blue Zone can be compared to the rest area signs where one goes to rest or re-energize. All of the zones are natural to experience, but the framework focuses on teaching students how to recognize and manage their Zone based on the environment and its demands and the people around them.'


