#### **COVID-19 Protocols - Update**

Thank you to all members of the community for following our COVID-19 protocols to keep everyone safe. Please be advised that if there is a COVID-19 case in a class in K-6 or 7-10, an email communication will come to families outlining that there has been a positive case in the class in K-6 or year group 7-10 and families will be asked to monitor for symptoms.

If a child presents with symptoms, families will be asked to test using a RAT (that was provided) or PCR and keep their children at home if they are showing any symptoms. The letter will also clearly outline the steps families need to take as they monitor symptoms and how to access learning if required. If a child is symptom free, they can still attend school.

We already have extra cleaning in place as an added precaution which I communicated in last week's Newsletter, but in the

event of a student presenting with COVID at school, we would do an additional deep clean to ensure there are no traces of the virus to keep all members of our community safe.

#### **Leave During Term Time**


Dominic College cannot support nor approve the taking of holidays during term time. This is a legal mandate in the 2016 Education Act and has been put in place to ensure that sound academic progress can take place with students being present at school in all classes. Schools have a legal responsibility to maintain accurate records of student attendance and as such, any holiday leave that is applied for will be recorded as unapproved. We ask that you plan carefully in advance around school holiday periods, our term dates are available on our website.

From time to time there will be students who are involved in interstate competitions or extraordinary circumstances that may warrant the need to take more than three days' leave. Applications for such leave can be lodged to us via the leave request form which can be obtained in the K-6 and 7-10 Offices. Once an application for leave has been received, you will receive either an email response or a formal letter from the Deputy Principal's office informing you of the status of the application. We thank you for your continued support and understanding.

#### **College Diary**

All students in K-10 have been provided with a College Diary for 2022 to help them to get organised by writing in their due dates for homework and assignments, dates for College activities and other reminders.

The diary is not a personal diary and should not be defaced with any form of artwork or graffiti. Parents may use the diary as a communication tool between home and school. In K-6, teachers may communicate

#### Religious Education 7 - 10

2022 Religious Education has started by students diving into some important concepts. The 7-10 students are beginning to deepen their understanding of themselves, their relationships with others, with God, and their appreciation for Religion in society.

#### Year 7

Our Year 7 students are exploring what it means to belong and especially what being in a Catholic community means. They are studying the history of the College, Salesian and Dominican religious orders, the Salesian Charter (Parish, Home, School, Playground), the meanings behind the Dominic College Crest, the religious symbols in our schools, core beliefs of Christianity, and discovering the important lives and messages of our four Patron Saints.

#### Year 8

Our Year 8 students have started to develop an understanding of the Jewish background of Jesus Christ. They are learning about important Jewish traditions, customs and culture, and about daily life in first century Palestine. They will research various Jewish groups and analyse how Jesus would have interacted with them and the possible conflict and resolutions involved.

#### Year 9

Our Year 9 students have started by diving straight into the Bible and exploring the Old Testament and New Testament. They are looking at the different literary forms used to tell the messages, important religious truths and understandings about humankind's relationship with God. They have been retelling the Old Testament stories in their own words and it has been great to see the depth of their understanding. Students will also be challenged to undertake a Scripture Exegesis on a passage from Luke's Gospel.

#### Year 10

Our Year 10 students are investigating World Religions. They have started by developing an appreciation of what religion and religious thinking has contributed to society, and by understanding what components are required for an ideology to be considered a religion. They have been asking great questions and discussing the importance of faith in multiple world religions.















#### Year 3

Welcome to de Paul (Year 3) for 2022. What a busy start we have had so far! It has been wonderful to see everyone settle into their new routines with their new teachers. In Year 3, lunch-time Extra-Curricular activities are available for students to sign up to — Choir, Dance, Readers Club, Library visits with more to come. Science investigations and novel studies have

also been a hit in our classrooms!

Here are some of the students' thoughts about what they like so far about being in de Paul:

**Brooke Thomas:** 'I like how we get to play outside games with Ms O'Grady and Miss Love. I've liked being able to spend time outside exploring and observing all the natural things and wildlife around the school grounds. I'm excited about being able to go to some new things at lunch like Readers Club and Choir.'

**Fletcher Whelan:** 'I like doing Maths in Year 3 and it's really fun to have Ms O'Grady and Miss Love as our teachers. It was exciting to go to Music because we got to do body percussion.'

**Maisy Jaeger:** 'I like listening to Miss Baker read Charlie and the Chocolate Factory to us. It is exciting because Mr. Wonka's Factory is very big and mysterious. We got to draw what we though the factory looked like!'

I spoke with four eloquent multilingual students, who graciously shared some deeply personal insights about language learning at Dominic College, and their own identities as multilingual people.


You all use a range of languages at home, and English at school. How do you feel about also learning Japanese at school?

There are some of the same sounds in Japanese as Krio so it is easy to know how to pronounce the words. The "r" sound in Krio and Ghanian have the same sound as Japanese, so it is easy when you come to school. (Jonievis)

I think it is easier if you can talk in a lot of languages. If you want to say something to other people who know your language, you can tell secrets in front of people who don't know! (Samuel L)

I would like to learn French, Spanish or Italian in the future. (Sherlin)

#### How do you feel about speaking a different language to your families?

I normally get afraid, embarrassed or shy to speak other languages in front of my friends, but sometimes they want to learn from me and I actually like that they want to hear from me. That makes me less afraid to share what I have. (Jonievis)

I am the same, I don't feel embarrassed but I feel shy. Sometimes my friends come over and say, 'that is cool', and I feel proud that it is unique to be me. (Sherlin)

I feel happy about speaking Indonesian because my grandpa on my mum's side doesn't understand English really well, but it makes it easier to communicate with him if I can speak Indonesian. (Samuel L)

Like Samuel, my grandma can't really speak English. My family are trying to teach her. When I skype with my grandma in Ghana, I am happy that I can talk to her and that she can understand me. (Jonievis)

### Sport K-10


