Academic Captains 7-10 Report

On Monday the 25 March, student leaders in Year 6 and 10 participated in a Sustainable Development Goals Workshop. The United Nations have defined the sustainable development goals as a universal call to action to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that by 2030 all people enjoy peace and prosperity. In this workshop we were introduced to seventeen sustainable development goals and the effect that these goals have on our community, both locally and globally.

During the workshop we completed different activities to help us understand the sustainable development goals. One of the activities was ranking all seventeen goals. We got into groups and each group ranked all seventeen goals from what they thought was the highest priority in Tasmania to what they thought was the lowest priority. After we learnt about the goals, we collected all the information we knew and used it to plan a similar workshop for our teachers which we would lead the following day.

The following day during the staff meeting we were able to, as student leaders, put ourselves to the test by directing a similar workshop. We used the knowledge that we had learnt the previous day to guide teachers on how they can implement these sustainable development goals into their own teachings and classroom environment. As well as getting them familiar with all seventeen goals. We conducted, as a group, many new activities as well as some we did the day before which we decided were imperative in understanding these goals fully. Activities like mixing and matching the goals with their correct definitions created a fun and competitive atmosphere, while still gathering a deeper understanding on why these goals are so important. Students teaching teachers is something new and exciting that we hope can be utilized again throughout the school year.

The URstrong Friendship Program

The ability to form strong, healthy relationships is important for children. In K-6 at Dominic College we use the URstrong Friendship Program to help teach our students the skills to maintain healthy friendships.

The URstrong Friendship Program teaches children the fundamentals of friendship, conflict resolution and emotional resilience. This evidence-based program is designed to equip children with practical strategies for fostering positive relationships and handling social challenges effectively.

Through the Friendology 101 Classroom Program, children learn the essential building blocks of friendships, such as empathy, communication and kindness. Students learn that conflict is a natural part of any relationships. Using tools such as the Friend-O-Cycle and Friend-O-Meter and languages such as 'friendship fires' and 'mean on purpose,' the URstrong Program teaches children effective strategies for managing conflicts. Encourgaing active listening, compromising and finding win-win solutions. Students learn to identify and express their emotions in a healthy way and navigate the ups and downs of friendships.

The URstrong website provides information for parents about the program.

This year Savio House is celebrating a year of 'friendship'. Inspired by the bright Savio banner in the Savio Centre, Savio holds 'friendship and joy' dearly to our hearts as we follow the learnings of our Patron Saint Dominic Savio.

Our House Captains set themselves the goal this year of enriching the friendships and relationships in our House, particularly in our Oratory Groups. Students in each OG are nominated to be a 'Head Shark' to support their group wellbeing and belonging, and helping us to live the school value that we are a home that welcomes every day. Each Oratory Group now runs a weekly gathering for the house called a 'House Collect', where we celebrate our successes through shout outs, and participate in a series of challenges for fun and fostering friendships within the house.

Our Savio Captains have been reflecting on the importance of Friendship in their lives, and what they have learned from their experiences.

'Friendship is important to me because it provides support, companionship, and a sense of connection with others. When facing a friendship challenge, I try to communicate openly and honestly with my friend to address any issues and find a resolution. If needed, I am willing to compromise and/or apologise to help rebuild the friendship.' - Mission Captain

Research highlights the health benefits of friendship to our wellbeing and the dangers of loneliness, as our Savio Academic Captain reflects: "Friendship is essential to our lives for support, companionship and a sense of belonging. It can enrich our learning and mental health, provide help during tough times and offer a sense of value and connection that is invaluable. "

It's been eye-opening for many of them to see how tasty and budget-friendly stir-fries can be. Our next area of focus will be International foods.

Over in textiles, Year 7 students are getting to grips with sewing by trying their hand at Sashiko stitching to make their own cushion. It's a nice change of pace, and they're picking up some handy skills along the way.

Meanwhile, Year 8 students are doing their bit for the planet by designing reusable bags from calico. It's all about being eco-friendly and making something useful at the same time.

We are strongly encouraging student to bring their own containers for cooking classes while we aim to be more sustainable. Students are able to leave these in the fridge to collect at the end of the day to make sure food stays fresh. Through these hands-on experiences in Food Technology and Textiles, students are not just learning practical skills; they're also having a great time getting creative and discovering new things about themselves.
