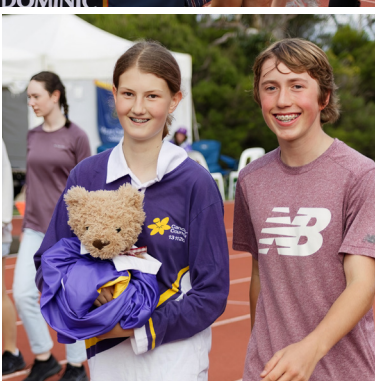

Faith Mission and Identity

Greetings all,

In the life of our Church and the Christian tradition this week, Holy Week, is the most sacred and important of the year. We commemorate the final days of the life and ministry of Jesus Christ when he brings to a conclusion all his teaching and mission on behalf of God his Father.

Here in the College we have held various ceremonies to remember these very special moments in the life of Jesus and help our students learn about and experience something of this very important story. They have been wonderful liturgical moments for us all.

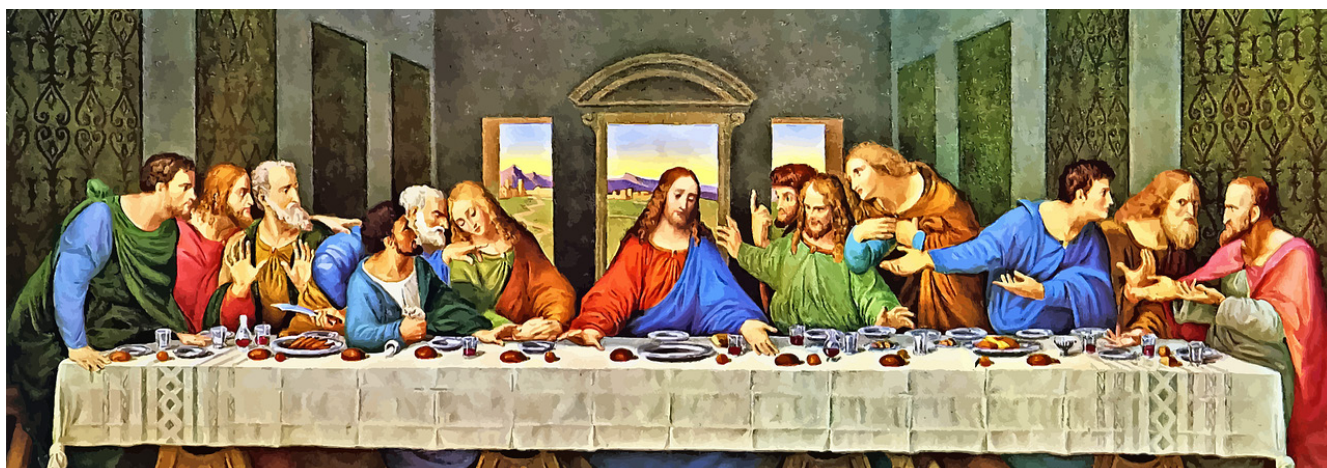
There are four major aspects we commemorate this week.

1. The enthusiastic **'Welcome of Jesus'** on his entry into Jerusalem by the crowds of people, both locals and visitors who had gathered in the city for the major Jewish festival of Passover. This is celebrated on Palm Sunday.
2. The celebration of the **'Last Supper of Jesus'** with his closest disciples where he gives witness to his style of servant leadership by washing their feet, and when he institutes the Eucharist by taking the bread and wine and transforming it to his Body and Blood. This is celebrated on Holy Thursday.
3. On Good Friday we commemorate the **'Betrayal of Jesus'** by his close friends to the Jewish and Roman authorities, the physical suffering that was then inflicted on him and his eventual humiliating death on the Cross as a criminal.
4. The final celebration takes place on Saturday evening and Easter Sunday morning when we recall the **'Resurrection of Jesus'** from the dead and the new life and salvation that this signifies.



These four aspects are key in our Christian understanding of the role that Jesus played in being 'God in the world', showing us the face of God in a human form, showing us how to live as the people of God.

Learning and Curriculum K-10

Term 1 Learning Reflection

Term 1 has seen a high volume of events, learning experiences and excursions across the College. Starting off the year with World Read Aloud day, our buddy classes in

the Primary school joined together to read and relax. Our 7-10 leaders visited the Pulana Precinct to join in the fun also. This was a great way to support and encourage reading with our students.

Our Kinder – Year 2 morning Literacy Block is now well established with the children having developed good routines following the implementation of our MultiLit program (InitialLit in Prep – Year 2 and PreLit in Kinder). This evidence-based program encompasses all areas for literacy and the children are enjoying feeling successful in their learning.

Year 7 students kicked off our Camps Program by staying at Fortescue Bay; participating in a wealth of outdoor education activities and forming strong friendships. Back at school, students learned about our Salesian history and heritage and explored aspects of the Salesian Charter. This was a great opportunity for students coming into Year 7 from all schools to get to know each other, and their House Lead Teacher, at the beginning of the year.

Not long after this, our Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students participated in NAPLAN. This was a change from previous years and we are proud of the efforts all students put into the testing. Results will be shared by NAPLAN in the coming months.

Year 5 had the opportunity to 'live their learning' at their recent Market Day. Dressed for Bible times they researched, prepared and presented fascinating stalls that highlighted specific aspects of life in the time of Jesus.

In amongst all our events, excursions and camps, students have been busy developing strong routines for learning. Teachers have been working getting to know students and delivering high quality programs. In response to this, teachers have completed Term 1 Expectation Reports. Da Vinci Decathlon Report

On Monday 3 April, Miss Fiddaman and I accompanied sixteen Year 8 students to the Hutchins School to participate in the 2023 Year 7/8 Da Vinci Decathlon.

Throughout the day, students were engaged in ten challenges on ten different topics. This year, I had the opportunity to move about the room and observe the students hard at work. It was great to see the students working as cohesive teams as they tackled the different challenges. And challenge is indeed the right word. Miss Fiddaman and I were required to mark the results of the English, Art & Poetry, Legacy, and Code Breaking challenges. Even with our combined wits (and an answer sheet) the marking was tough going. Our admiration for the students who had to provide answers to the challenges grew exponentially throughout the marking sessions.

To our great delight, when the results were read out at the end of the day, one of the College's teams won the English Award – the first team to win an individual award in the time that I have facilitated the College's Co-Curricular Program. An added bonus was that the majority of the team had been taught English by Miss Fiddaman in Year 7.

Yesterday, it was Ms Court and Miss Crawford's turn to come along as we oversaw a colossal 32 students from Years 9 and 10 participate in their competition. Again, we three were incredibly impressed by the efforts of the students. With the Year level moving up, however, so did the difficulty of the marking. Miss Crawford informed me that the Mathematics challenge was particularly taxing.

This time, the results for the Year 9 Competition rang with the name of 'Dominic College'. Dominic College Year 9 Team 1 took out the Creative Producer Award, the Code Breaking Award, and the Art & Poetry Award and finished fourth statewide. Year 9 Team 2 won the Cartography challenge and finished 5th statewide. These results are truly exceptional and represent Dominic's best performance.

I must take the opportunity here to thank Year 9 students Poppy Lincoln, Ainsley Ludwig, Gracie Gallahar-Gore, Chyler Goodsell, Samantha Clay, Ella Donaghy, Pheobe Moy, and Matilda Christmann-Price for stepping up at the eleventh hour and volunteering to participate. Without their willingness to participate, we would not have had a team and would have lost an opportunity.

I predicted in my previous newsletter article that I would report on a successful Da Vinci Decathlon. In hindsight, a more appropriate adjective would have been 'inspirational'. Every student who participated on Monday and Wednesday was nothing short of inspirational in the way they participated and represented their College with pride, dignity, and academic rigor.

I would also like to express my gratitude to Miss Amy Fiddaman, Ms Bonnie Court, and Miss Katie Crawford for giving up their time during the busy last week of term to accompany me and our students

College News - Compliance & Resources

Dear Families

During the first half of 2023 the College will continue to work on a number of capital work projects across the site. There will be some new projects starting as we head into the term 1 holidays, families will need to be aware of some changes to the driveway and parking arrangements during the holidays and throughout Term 2.

- **Bus parking and turning circle;** Works to continue into Term 2 with an expected completion of June 2023 – During the Term 1 break the main driveway will be closed at the crossing while new services are installed. This will mean that access to the Valdocco (6-10) Precinct and the Business Office will be restricted to pedestrians only. Parking in the *pulana* (K-2) and Prouille (3-5) Precinct's will be available as normal.
- **Shared path and parking spaces at the front of the College;** The Glenorchy City Council (GCC) will commence work on an additional 10+ parking spaces and a shared pedestrian/bike path along the front of the College on Tolosa Street. At this stage works are schedule for completion in June 2023.
- ***pulana* precinct – Parking aisle 3;** Over the coming weeks, construction will commence on the third parking aisle, which will provide a number of additional onsite parking spaces and paths.

In addition to the upcoming works I would also like to take the opportunity to remind families of some changes that have been made as a result of the recent and upcoming works.

- Traffic should not proceed past the Prouille carpark when dropping off, or picking up students. Parking in front of the Oratory Space can be used when coming to the school for any other matter where access to the Business Office, or Valdocco Precinct is necessary.
- The College now has only one dedicated drop off and pick up lane, which is located directly in front of the *tuminana* (kinder) classrooms. Families using the Prouille car park are asked to take the first available car space and need to avoid dropping students off without parking first.
- Parking adjacent to the top soccer pitch, College Chapel and the Prouille car park is reserved for College staff – Please do not park in these spaces under any circumstances

Jackie loved coming back to school and the church, and loved seeing all the children and staff and priests each year. We believe he has cooked about 45,000 sausages in his years on the barbeque. He helped with so many activities, especially on school camps and excursions and he was often away on these trips. He was always reliable and always smiling.

Peter 'Jackie' Allsopp turned 80 on 24 March 2023 and celebrated with friends and family. God bless you, Peter. Thank you for your service to the College.
