From the Principal

Dear Families and Friends,

As Term 2 continues to unfold we are blessed as a faith community to have opportunities for reflection and celebration, it is essential to recognise two significant events in the Catholic community: Pentecost and the Feast of Mary Help of Christians that are central to our life as a community.

Pentecost Sunday is celebrated 50 days after Easter and marks the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles. This event, often considered the *"birthday of the Church,"* empowered the apostles to preach the Gospel in different languages, symbolising the universal reach of Christ's message.

Pentecost reminds us of the Holy Spirit's role in guiding and uniting the Church, inspiring us to spread faith across diverse cultures and communities. The Holy Spirit's arrival empowered the apostles with the gifts of wisdom, courage, and understanding, fostering a spirit of mission within the Church.

I had the privilege of attending mass last Sunday with members of staff and several families at our local parish **St John the Baptist, Glenorchy** to take part in a Multilingual Mass to celebrate the many cultures and languages present in our community.

The Salesians honour Mary Help of Christians as their principal patron, seeking her guidance and protection in their educational and pastoral activities. We were fortunate to commence our day today with a lovely prayer service in Oratory classes to mark this special feast day.

Pentecost calls us to embrace the Holy Spirit's gifts and spread the Gospel, while the Feast of Mary Help of Christians inspires us to support and uplift one another, especially the young, in our educational endeavours.

At Dominic College, we are very fortunate to have the opportunity to take part in excursions through our coursework and as part of co-curricular activities. These excursions give us the chance to expand our knowledge base and learn in an environment outside of the classroom.

Last Thursday 16 May, students from Physical and Life Sciences, along with other selected students, participated in the UTAS Science & Engineering Challenge. This

science outreach program aims to broaden students' perceptions of science and engineering, encouraging us to consider careers in these fields by exposing us to aspects we wouldn't typically encounter in a school setting. During the event, we were engaged in a variety of practical group challenges, such as efficiently powering a small city, building an energy-generating wind turbine, and constructing a wooden plane to be launched across the room. All students thoroughly enjoyed their experience at this event, represented the College with pride, and demonstrated to others the benefits of taking part in one of the many co-curricular opportunities that the College has to offer.

On Friday 17 May, the 9/10 Media arts class attended an excursion to the Botanical Gardens. This excursion gave students the chance to expand their subject matter, and photograph things that would otherwise be unavailable to them. Focusing on composition and manual settings, it was another great opportunity for these students to learn practical skills with cameras that they will be able to build upon, both inside and outside of the classroom.

All students are encouraged to get involved in as many different co-curricular activities as they can throughout the year, and to make the most of excursions when the opportunities arise.

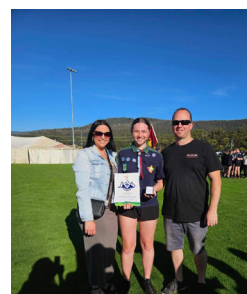
Tahlia's Journey

In March 2024, Tahlia Sulman was awarded the *National Scout Medallion* which is the peak award for Australian Scouting. It was earned upon the completion of all competencies, including a series of extensive technical and physical tasks throughout 4 years of scouting with the Lindisfarne Scout Troop.

Tahlia gained many leadership, teamwork and life skills through activities including orienteering, camping, hiking for days in remote locations, first aid and problem solving. Over the 4 years she hiked 254 kilometres, many in rough terrain with a heavy pack and camped 26 nights in some of the most beautiful remote areas Tasmania has to offer. Tahlia and her patrol also won the *State Scout Clark Trophy* against all remaining Scout Troops in Tasmania, 4 years in a row. This Trophy is an annual event for all Tasmania Scout Troops over 3 days, in select remote locations. Tahlia was challenged, often in undesirable ground and weather conditions, where scout knowledge and preparation is key while a series of technical challenges were carried out, scored and tallied on the final day to determine the winners.

In March 2023, Tahlia also joined as an *Australian Army Cadet* and is currently working towards rank of Lance Corporal and hopes to earn the rank of Sergeant in the coming years. During ANZAC Day last month, she represented her unit and held the position of the Flag Bearer for the Dawn Service and then went to a second location and marched as a member of the Catafalque Party for the morning service.

Tahlia's achievements, her dedication and ability to teach, help and support others, is a credit to her leadership, initiative, and independence. She dedicates her accomplishments to great mentors in her Scout Troop Leaders, who taught her discipline, resilience, life skills and she hopes to now motivate and inspire younger students to follow in her footsteps.

Learning and Curriculum - Year 1

Year 1 Students Illuminate the Sky with Art Inspired by the Southern Lights

On Saturday 11 May, many of our students were lucky enough to witness the beautiful display of our Southern Lights. This natural light display, also known as the Aurora Australis, dazzled the night sky with its vibrant colours. Inspired by this celestial spectacle, our Year 1 classes have been hard at work creating beautiful pieces of art that capture the essence of this natural wonder.

The Southern Lights served as a perfect bridge to our current science unit, which focuses on the changing sky. Our young artists have been exploring how natural phenomena like the auroras occur and the science behind these stunning displays. The children have learned about the interaction between solar wind and the Earth's magnetic field, which creates the luminous glow seen in the sky.

Under the guidance of their teachers, the Year 1 students used a variety of mediums to express their interpretations of the Southern Lights. The classroom has been filled with vibrant paintings, pastel drawings, crayons, each reflecting the unique



perspective and creativity of the young artists.

In addition to the art projects, students have been integrating their observations into science lessons. They have been learning about the causes of different types of weather and how various atmospheric conditions can change the sky's appearance. The excitement of seeing the Southern Lights has sparked a deeper interest in the natural world and how it functions.

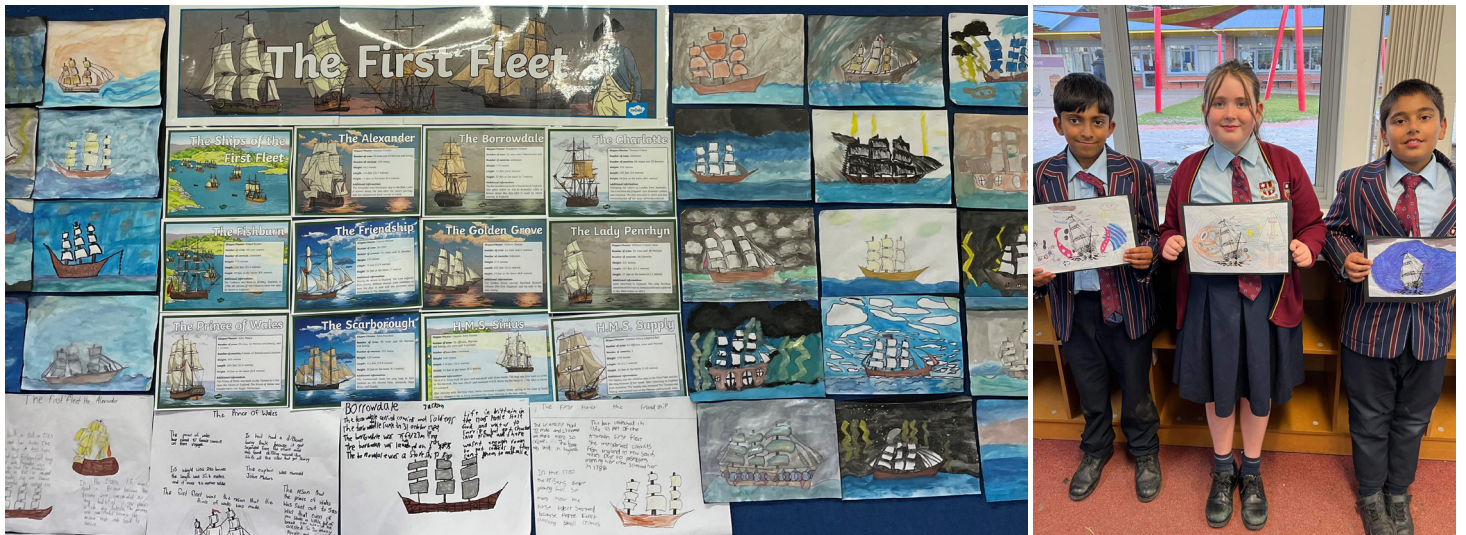
Learning and Curriculum - Year 4

In Year 4, our students have been on an exciting journey through history, diving into the world of England in the 1700s. They've explored the establishment of the first British colony and the epic voyage of the First Fleet, learning about the ships, writing narratives from the perspective of child convicts and creating stunning watercolour paintings of the fleet.

But history isn't just about exploration—it's also about understanding. Our students have reflected on the impact of the First Fleet's arrival on First Nations Australians, fostering empathy and a deeper appreciation for reconciliation.

Through their research, writing and artwork our Year 4 scholars have brought history to life, inspiring us all to continue learning and understanding the world around us.

Learning and Curriculum - Mathematics

Mathematics education is a journey that equips students with essential analytical skills. This term we are teaching some key concepts such as Pythagoras' Theorem and Trigonometry, fractions and ratios, exponential functions and logarithmic functions in Year 7-10. Each of these topics plays a critical role in developing a comprehensive understanding of mathematics.

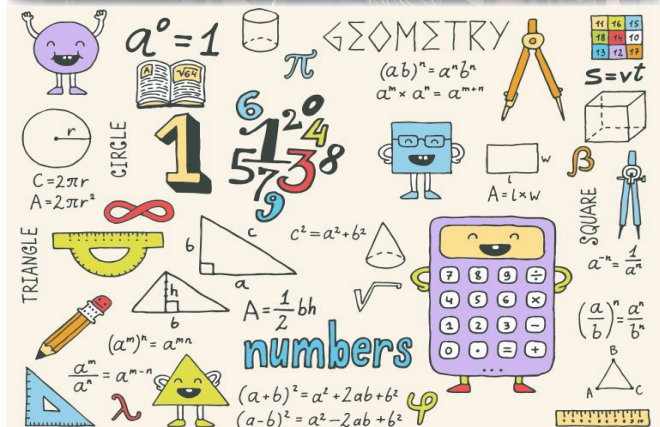
Pythagoras' Theorem and Trigonometry are vital for solving problems involving right-angled triangles. The applications of these two concepts is so vast and varied making them indispensable in both theoretical and practical realms. Their utility spans from the microscopic scale of engineering components to the astronomical scale of the universe, demonstrating their fundamental importance in our understanding and interaction with the world around us.

Fractions and Ratios are the building blocks of proportional reasoning. Teaching fractions involves helping students understand the concept of a part of a whole, equivalence and operations with fractions. Ratios, on the other hand, compare two quantities, showing how many times one value contains the other. Mastery of these concepts is crucial for advanced topics such as probability, scaling in geometry and algebraic expressions.

Exponential and logarithmic functions are key concepts in algebra and calculus. Exponential functions model real-world issues such as population growth, radioactive decay and compound interest. Understanding the properties and application of these functions is crucial for higher-level mathematics and sciences.

By building a strong foundation in these mathematical concepts we try to empower students to approach complex mathematical challenges with confidence and skill.
