Social Media Legislation Changes

The Australian Government is introducing new legislation that will prevent children under 16 from holding accounts on most social media platforms. This law comes into effect on 10 December 2025 and is designed to protect young people from online harm such as cyberbullying, inappropriate content, and excessive screen time.

Parents are encouraged to talk with their children about the changes and reset expectations around social media use. Start the conversation early – ask your child what they have heard and how they feel and review online safety habits together. Stay informed with resources provided by the eSafety Commissioner.

A Prayer for the End of Term

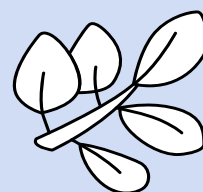

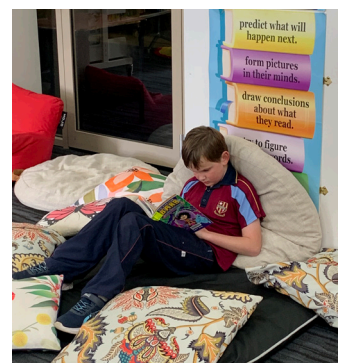
Encouraging Responsible Technology Use During the Term Break

The eSafety Commissioner is an excellent resource for families, offering practical tips, guides, and tools to help children navigate the digital world safely.

Make Time for Reading

During the term break, we encourage all students from Kindergarten to Year 10 to make time for reading each day. Reading not only strengthens literacy and language skills, but also sparks imagination, builds empathy, and encourages a lifelong love of learning. - Greater sense of purpose

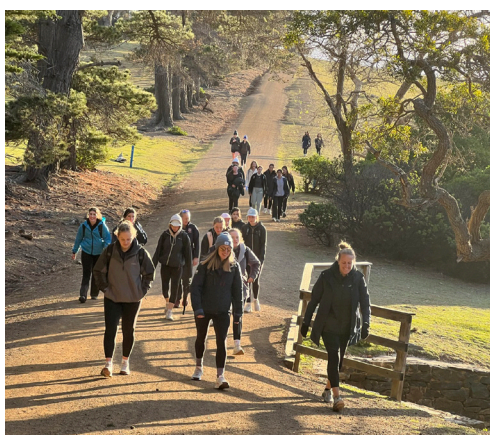

Creative Arts Captains' Report

Drama Production

This term, the Year 9/10 Drama class worked on a production focused on developing stagecraft skills and preparing for the challenge of senior drama. Our show, *The Day the Internet Died*, explored how a small American town reacts when the internet is suddenly cut off as part of a social experiment. As a cast member, it was an absolute joy to collaborate with such talented peers on this meaningful production.

Directed by Dr Marty Crerar, we rehearsed throughout the term and performed four shows—two matinees and two evening performances. It was a truly collaborative experience.

We also introduced a new show this year: *Out of the Shadows and Into the Light*, a cabaret-style performance designed by the Creative Arts Captains. This replaced Talking Heads, and while we initially aimed for a musical, we landed on a hybrid musical/drama cabaret. Featuring voluntary acts from Years 7–10, each performance embraced minimalism,

using just one prop to tell its story.



Visual Arts Exhibition

This term saw the return of our bi-annual Visual Arts Exhibition, themed *Light*. The showcase featured collaborative class projects and individual works from senior Visual Arts and Media students, all guided by our amazing teachers.

Senior Visual Arts students worked with professional artists Jamin and Luke to create expressive stencil and spray-painted leaf artworks, which were displayed as a collective piece. Students also exhibited personal works in sketching, painting, and clay.

Media Arts students contributed through poster designs and a photography competition which was inspired by Mr David Hockney. Posters promoted either the exhibition or the upcoming Music and Dance Showcase. We loved being part of the competition, it added a fun, interactive element for attendees.

One of the most powerful aspects of the exhibition was its ability to unite all three precincts of our College in a vibrant celebration of creativity. It fostered connection and collaboration across our diverse student body, something Dominic College continues to champion.

Music and Dance Showcase

The 2025 *Music and Dance Showcase* was a huge success, held on the evening of 18 September. The event featured a wide range of performances from individual students and ensembles, with a packed audience of family, friends, and staff.

Highlights included the Lunchtime Dance Ensemble led by the Siena Creative Arts Captain, a solo trombone performance by a Bosco Captain, and an original composition by a Savio Captain, accompanied by a Guzman Captain. We also had performances from different College bands, dance groups, Taiko drummers and singers. Hands on learning experiences continue to be provided to our students, increasing engagement and motivation and allowing them to

problem solve and build critical thinking skills. It was wonderful to start the term with the whole College gathering in *pulana* for NAIDOC Week Celebrations and being able to explore the amazing new artworks in each classroom. We have seen a wonderful shift in the growth mindset of our Kinder – Year 2 students and are so proud of the way they are approaching their learning experiences. Incursions and Excursions also provided a wonderful opportunity for our students to engage in real life learning situations.



Upper Primary - *Prouille* Precinct

Every term is busy, and Term 3 is no exception. During these last ten weeks we celebrated Science Week, Book Week and had the opportunity to come together as a community to observe NAIDOC Week. Just before we travelled to the Moonah Arts Centre to see the culmination of Semester 1 art classes displayed at the Visual Arts Exhibition, every student participated in a Bus Safety lesson as part of their Health class. During August, there was a chance for selected students to test their academic prowess and pit themselves against the best from around Australia in the Prime Minister's Spelling Bee as well as the International Competitions and Assessment for Schools (ICAS) Tests in Maths, English and Spelling. Students in Year 4 gained a firsthand understanding with a trip on the twin masted, square sailed wooden tall ship the Lady Nelson and Year 6 flew off to Canberra to deepen their knowledge of Civics and Citizenship. All of these wonderful experiences expanded the learning that was happening in classrooms allowing students to stretch their understanding in real world situations.

Secondary - Valdocco Precinct

It has been an exciting and rewarding term for our students, with many opportunities to extend their learning and showcase their talents across a wide range of areas.

Several of our students proudly participated in the prestigious international ICAS assessments in Mathematics, English and Science. Their willingness to challenge themselves in these competitions reflects their commitment to academic growth and excellence.

Our VET Hospitality students have also been putting their skills into practice, contributing to the Volunteer Breakfast as well as catering for the Visual Art Exhibition Opening and the Music and Dance Showcase. These experiences gave them the chance to share their learning with the wider community in authentic and meaningful ways.

In the Arts, our Drama students have been working tirelessly behind the scenes and on stage to bring the College Production *'The Day the Internet Died'* to life, while our Music, Dance and Visual Art students have enriched our community through creative performance and exhibition.

Beyond the Arts, our Year 10 students took part in an interactive learning experience aimed at raising awareness of global human well-being. Through a simulation of real-world conditions, they gained valuable insight into the inequalities of food and wealth distribution faced by communities across the world today. Meanwhile, our Year 7 students engaged in an excursion focused on sustainability, sparking conversations about how they can make a positive impact on the future of our planet.

National Science Week added another highlight to the term, with students enjoying hands-on experiments, challenges and activities that made science both fun and inspiring.

The term ended on a high note for the Year 9 students, who attended the Year 9 Camp at Maria Island this week. The gender separated camp featured a range of exciting and team-building activities, and we hope all participants had an enjoyable experience!

Students were divided into two groups: Year 9 Girls (22-24 Sept) and Year 9 Boys (24-26 Sept). They travelled from the College to Triabunna with Redline Coaches, then took the Encounter-Maria Island ferry to Darlington, where they stayed in bunk beds within the historic Penitentiary. The camp's focus was to leverage the island's unique environment for authentic learning opportunities, including an engaging hike. The island's convict history came to life as students stayed in historical convict buildings and explored the story of Irish convict William Smith O'Brien, who was once held there. While one group was at camp, the other engaged in various activities back at school. Students thoroughly enjoyed both the camp and the alternate program.

We are proud of all our students for their enthusiasm, hard work and willingness to contribute.
