### What to do if you see distressing content online

Online spaces should be safe for everyone, but you may sometimes come across content that is distressing – for example, because it depicts harm or violence.

Violent or pro-terror content may also be illegal.

Under Australian law, the eSafety Commissioner can issue a takedown notice to a platform to remove the content, or block access to protect Australian users from viewing this content.

If you see violent or terrorist content posted in a public place online, don't share it further – even if your intention is to help or raise awareness. You may cause distress to others.

#### **Report**

If you see violent, distressing or harmful material, make a report to the platform or service where it is available. Reports to the service help get the material removed quickly. Your actions could protect you and others from seeing that content again.

If the material is not removed, or if it's seriously harmful, you can make a report online by visiting 'eSafety - how to make a report'.

Reports about terrorist and extreme violent content can also be made over telephone to the National Security Hotline on 1800 123 400.

#### **Protect**

Parents and carers may feel that they want to take extra precautions against their children seeing disturbing content online.

The eSafety Commissioner's website has helpful resources on how to get started with **parental controls in social media, games, and apps** and **on devices**. These controls can help parents restrict access to places online where there is a higher risk of seeing disturbing content.

There is also advice for young people on what they can do themselves.

#### Get help and support

If you or your child have seen disturbing content online, talking to someone can make it easier to decide what to do and how to deal with its impact.



#### **New Bus Zone Completion**

#### Changes came into effect at the start of Term 4. It is important to note the following:

- No unauthorised vehicles are to come past the crossing on the main driveway this includes student drop-off and pick up. If there is a legitimate reason for driving past the crossing i.e. a pastoral care issue, coming into the business office, or attending a meeting, this will be permitted.
- The College has **ONE** dedicated drop off and pick up zone, which is directly in front of the Kinder classrooms. Students are not to be dropped off or picked up in any of the other areas on College grounds. It is expected that you are parked within an allocated car space before allowing children to exit your vehicle.
- There is no vehicle access between K-2 and the main driveway. If you require access to both areas, then you will need to use Tolosa Street to drive between the precincts.

#### Student and Parent Support

Over the school holidays on 10 October, World Mental Health Day was recognised. This is an important day on the calendar, acknowledging people and families who are navigating

mental health conditions.

Access to support is critical for managing mental health conditions and concerns can often go undiagnosed and therefore remain untreated. This can impact significantly on other facets of health and life.

We all have a role to play in removing the stigma around mental health and the way we respond to people needing support can help to make a difference. People experiencing mental health issues often describe the deep level of sadness and isolation they feel and the helplessness of having nowhere to turn. Ensuring people feel heard is a great step in the right direction. We are not expected to be experts but offering time to listen and space to talk can make a difference for someone who is struggling with their mental health.

When it's time to engage with the experts, there are many services that can help. Sometimes it's just the difficulty of knowing where to start. Your GP is always a great place to begin as they are linked in with services in their area and can connect you with local and current information.

We live in a world which is very complex, and we often need to try and get our minds around issues and situations which are very complicated and difficult to grasp. In the last week or so three

very different but important matters come to mind in this regard.

The first is a national/Australian issue—the referendum held last Saturday in which we as adult individuals were asked to make a decision on a very significant issue regarding the future of our nation and a way forward regarding the relationships between the members of our country which we and our young people will have to live by. Irrespective of how we may have voted the matter of respect, justice and equity for all people in our nation remains, whether we are from the centuries old First Nations peoples or recent arrivals as refugees or migrants or somewhere in between.

The second is a wider issue in our world: the renewed tensions of conflict in the Middle East with the war between the Palestinian and Israeli peoples which has shown on both sides the lack of respect for the dignity of human life. This is only one example of conflict in our world, there are many others in our world which do not get the media attention they deserve. Many of these have global implications like the war between

Ukraine and Russia has shown us.









The third is more restricted to our Catholic Church. During the month of October there is a significant meeting taking place in the Vatican on 'Synodality' which is fundamentally about the way we as human beings listen to, value and respect one another within the Christian tradition.

For me, these three current issues remind me of the very reason we as Dominic College exist, we want our young people to be:

Learners in all things – a school that prepares for life

People of Spirituality – a parish that evangelises

Part of a playground of Joy – a place where everyone gathers as friends


#### **Year 10 Retreat**

#### Year 3

#### Back to the 1800s Day

During Term 3, Year 3 students spent a lot of time studying the Australian picture book and television series, 'My Place'. 'My Place' tells the story of a patch of land in Sydney on which the Gadigal people have lived for thousands of years. Beginning in 1988, the story jumps back a decade at a time,

learning about a child, their family, events and celebrations, as well as the physical features of the place. As a culmination of our studies, students and teachers role played a school day in the 1800s. We dressed up, separated our desks, turned off modern technology and had lessons that were a bit different. Students sang 'God Save the Queen' (Queen Victoria), balanced books on their heads to improve posture and followed rules such as standing when speaking and bowing or curtseying to teachers or visitors. Sporting activities included traditional games such as Marbles, Hopscotch and a jumping competition with sticks called Fly. Fortunately, all students avoided the cane on the day!

#### Canberra Trip - Year 6 Learning in Focus

In the final week of Term 3 sixty-four Year 6 students visited our nation's capital — Canberra. It was a sensational four-day trip filled with amazing learning experiences. Each place we visited provided new insights and deepened the educational understandings of the work that had been done during our History units about

'Democracy' and 'The Australian Government'.

We stayed in very comfortable accommodation close to all the main attractions. Each room held three to six people and we followed the paths through the gardens, past the playground to the dining area for the ample and delicious meals.

During the daylight hours we were SUPER busy and had an amazing time looking, listening and learning! Our time at the War Memorial provided an opportunity to pay respects to, and learn about the brave and committed service men and women both past and present. The Museum of Democracy allowed us to view a number of interesting artefacts including the protest banners and at the National Gallery we saw some awe-inspiring art works like Jackson Pollock's Blue Poles. The visit to Parliament House and the Electoral Education Office provided enriching learning experiences made even more real when students had the opportunity to participate in a role-play in both places. The worlds of Science and Technology were explored at Geoscience Australia and through an after dark visit to Questacon.

A highlight for many students this year was the opportunity to buy a limited-edition coin at the Mint. The 50-cent coin commemorates 60 years of the Bathurst 1000 Race. Another special moment was the visit to the Peace Park and the chance to strike the Peace Bell. This was such a moving experience and we are delighted to be able to hold our very own Peace Ceremony later this term for students in Years 3-6. Time at Sportex, within the Australian Institute of Sport, was as popular as it has always been with students and the evening swim at the Canberra International Aquatic Centre was great fun! The High Court was inspiring and our private tour inside Government House fascinating. The final venue, Floriade, was a lovely way to end our Canberra journey. The perfect weather we had whilst in Canberra was just right for this lovely floral celebration of Spring.

The teachers all worked hard to keep everyone back home fully informed of our adventures via posts and photographs on Seesaw and we enjoyed reading the messages sent by family, friends and well-wishers.

An excellent trip and an enriching learning experience for our students on many levels. Thanks to the Australian Government for providing \$300 funding (PACER) per student in recognition of the importance of this trip as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. This amount was deducted from the cost per head thus reducing the total amount payable for families.

#### English 7-10

On 15 August, twelve Year 7, eleven Year 8, fourteen Year 9 and fourteen Year 10 students sat the English ICAS test. ICAS stands for International Competitions and Assessments for Schools and are a suite of tests that are designed specifically for primary and secondary students. ICAS are conducted annually in Australia and in over 20 countries in Asia, Africa, Europe, Pacific countries, and America. All 41 participants from Dominic performed extremely well in the ICAS with three Year 9 students, Brooke Ackerley, William Ackroyd and Lilly Ryton-Benson receiving a distinction certificate, ranking them in the top 89 to 99% of students in Tasmania.

We are often asked the questions, 'Why should students sit tests and exams and aren't there better ways of assessing people than testing them?' Whilst students are assessed through a varied regime of assessment tasks, tests are still of fundamental importance in developing academic and life skills. Testing plays a significant role in students' development and personal growth in various ways. Firstly, it allows for an assessment of one's knowledge, skills, and abilities. The feedback from tests helps students understand their strengths and weaknesses, allowing them to focus on areas that need improvement. Testing is also often used to assess practical skills, such as problem solving, critical thinking, and decision-making. Regular testing can stimulate the development of these skills and help students become more proficient in their use. Thirdly, preparing for tests encourages students to manage their time effectively. This skill is not only important for academic success but is also a valuable life skill. Finally, preparing for tests often requires self-discipline and organisation. Another skill that is essential for success in education and many other aspects of life.

Learning to plan, prepare and embrace the uncertainty and anxiety that accompanies any test are important skills for students to develop; skills that will support them through the rest of their lives.
