Learning and Wellbeing - Upper Primary

In recent years the science of reading and structured literacy has become a prominent topic in education. There has been a lot of research done on how children learn, particularly in reading and spelling.

A structured literacy approach is evidence based, explicitly, systematically, and cumulatively taught. Student progress is carefully monitored and informed by data. Structured literacy instruction includes what teachers refer to as the Big 6 of Reading: oral language, phonological awareness, phonics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension.

Our classroom instruction and targeted interventions in the 3-6 classes all follow a structured literacy approach. Our small group literacy interventions use the MacqLit Program which is evidence based and covers all the Big 6. Lead teachers and Learning Support Assistants all run groups in MacqLit four times per week for Years 3-6.

All our students have the opportunity to access high quality classroom instruction and additional targeted intervention is offered to students who are identified as needing it through our assessments and data. A structured literacy approach backed by research is particularly important for students with specific learning difficulties, such as dyslexia.

If you are concerned about your child's literacy progress it is beneficial to talk to their teachers first to gain an understanding of where they are at and how they can best be supported.

Our class novel, *The Wild Robot* by Peter Brown, has brought literacy to life with thrilling themes of adaptation, survival, and friendship. Students are captivated by the robot's journey in the wilderness, making meaningful connections to their studies in science.

This term, students are also embracing sustainability, learning about impactful choices to protect the environment and developing a strong sense of stewardship.

It's been an inspiring start to Term 4, and we look forward to all the learning and growth ahead!
