NAIDOC Week

On Wednesday at the K-10 Assembly we celebrated, in anticipation, NAIDOC Week. NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. The actual date for this celebration is from 6 to 13 July; however, the students will be on holidays. The theme for 2014 is *Serving Country: Centenary and Beyond*, honouring all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women who fought in defence of our country.



Our ceremony was based around this theme. Our students are to be congratulated on the manner in which they led this celebration. Following are some facts the students presented at



the gathering:

'When war broke out in 1914, 400 Aboriginal men enlisted despite the government stipulating they were ineligible.'

'70 Tasmanian Aborigines were among those who volunteered to fight for a country which did not even count them as citizens.'

'John Miller, a Tasmanian, volunteered his service in 1914. Sadly Private Miller did not return, along with countless others, he was killed in action on 25 April 1915.'

'Alfred Hearps was born in Forth, near Devonport. In August 1916 in Northern France Alfred was killed in action. Second Lieutenant Alfred Hearps has no known grave and is commemorated on the Villers-Bretonneux Memorial in France.'

'Today more than 800 Indigenous Australians continue to serve in the ADF.'

To conclude the ceremony Hayden Clark led us in the Aboriginal Our Father.

On the first day of the next school term, parents and students will meet with teachers to formulate some goals for the rest of the year, and these goals should not be limited to school marks, but also to general personal development, as mentioned above. You have all been invited to think about this during the school holidays, and I would encourage everyone to respond positively to this invitation.

In the meantime I hope all our students will have a safe and restful break.

Child Health and Parenting Service

If your child is aged 3 1/2 to 5 and has not had a Healthy Kids Check (including vision and hearing assessment) an appointment for this check is recommended, either with your local Child and Family Health Nurse or GP.

Arriving at school on time

I hope all of our students from K-10 will have a restful break when they can re-energise ready for returning to classes in Term 3. Normal classes resume on Tuesday 22 July following our goal setting day (student free day) on Monday 21 July.

I have noticed there are increasing numbers of students arriving late. Everyone Needs a Friend

Here's an article from the KidsMatter website I found helpful. It speaks of children's friendships and their ups and downs.

When friendships are going well they support children's emotional wellbeing and confidence, as well as providing someone to play with. Positive friendships help children have fun, and also help them cope during periods of stress and change. This is why having friends at school is so important for children.

"Those girls at school are mean. I told them about this great game but they wouldn't play it. They said I couldn't play with them."

Rebecca, who is seven, plays happily at home with her four year-old sister Samantha. Samantha adores her big sister and will do anything she says. But with school friends it's not so easy. Rebecca's mother wonders whether the other children really are mean or whether Rebecca may be too pushy.

When children come over to visit it seems to go well as long as they are doing what Rebecca wants. But if they want to do something different, Rebecca often sulks or goes off in a huff.

Helping children with friendship's ups and downs

It is not always easy for children to know how to manage friendships. Problems with friends can affect how children feel about themselves and their enthusiasm for activities that involve others. Parents and carers can help children learn the kinds of friendship skills they will need as they grow and develop.

Learning how to make and keep friends involves a number of skills. Children learn more and more complex social skills from those around them as they develop. Home life has an effect on the development of social skills. A child who has an adoring little sister is likely to have more leadership skills. A child who is the little sister may be more used to fitting in with what others want to do. These children are likely to react differently when they go to school and meet other children with different life experiences and social skills.

How parents and carers can help

You can help children by listening to them talk about the everyday joys and troubles that arise out of their friendships. Asking what might have led to others' reactions can help the child, with your assistance, to think of possible solutions.


Captain's Corner

LEARNING IN FOCUS

K-6

During Term 2 Year 1 students have been trialling a new learning tool, **Skoolbo** (www.skoolbo.com.au) aimed at helping children with Reading and Maths.

Children are immersed in an incredible learning world and become highly motivated by inbuilt rewards mechanisms designed to encourage healthy use and to maximise learning.

The results have been very good. All students are excited to be using it during our work times. In the last fortnight, access has been given to Years 3 and 4 and at the beginning of next term all K-6 students at Dominic College will be able to use the site. Each child has been provided with an account that grants full free use of the program both at home and school. The site is accessed through downloading the free app from iTunes or the program from the web. The instructions are below:

How to get going at home:

1. Visit www.skoolbo.com.au/downloads and download the software. Skoolbo is available on tablets (iPads and Androids), computers (PCs and Macs) and through the Internet browser.
2. Open the software and select HOME use.
3. Insert your child's username. The password (always a colour and an animal) is by default the colour BLACK and the animal BEE, although your child may have changed this at school.

Tips for maximum benefit

- Encourage your child to use Skoolbo four to five times per week for around 20-30 minutes each time (this should be about ten games, after which your child is rewarded with a Lucky Prize).
- Don't let other children (or adults) play on your child's account. Skoolbo uses a smart algorithm that determines the most appropriate learning activities specifically for your child based on his or her recent performance. Other users could affect the level of activity presented to your child.
- Celebrate your child's successes, such as 1000 Correct Answer milestones and other improvement awards.
- Refer to the Parent Guide available at the Downloads tab on the website for additional tips and instructions.

There's no advertising on Skoolbo and no in-app purchases. Children are not able to communicate on Skoolbo and there is no possibility of unsafe interactions.

Postcard from Boston College

Dear Students, Parents and Staff,

I am thinking of you all as Term 2 draws to conclusion and my time at Boston College also concludes this week. I hope that students and teachers enjoy a well-deserved winter break.

Boston College is another of Boston's outstanding universities. It is one of around 200 Catholic colleges and universities in the USA and was established by the Jesuits in 1863. Its motto, 'Ever to Excel' is certainly apparent in the fine teaching I have experienced in the School of Theology and Ministry.

I am completing the last part of a course called Sharing Faith in a Secular Age with Professor Tom Groome, one of America's most influential thinkers on contemporary religious education.

The course has challenged me to reflect about the nature of our community at Dominic College and ways we can

learn from each other to further explore our shared Christian faith and to learn from the richness of the Catholic tradition.

Our various class conversations have affirmed a deeply held conviction that we find God in our own story, the story of others and in the ordinary and everyday of life.

I have argued in my class young people today are more deeply spiritual than ever before. As a generation they are marked by a quest for authenticity – for seeing and deciding according to their experience of truths.

Young people also have a fervent quest for meaning and purpose - they want their lives to be worthwhile and know they can make a real difference. Their quest for true intimacy is at times quite remarkable – they want their lives to matter to people for their own goodness and worth.

They are very much the face of God in our community. Indeed they are our greatest gift and hope for discerning and creating the emerging 21st century church.

Schoolkids Bonus payments update


The Federal Government's Schoolkids Bonus payments are automatically paid in January and July to eligible families and students. There is no need to make a claim. The Department of Human Services have advised that as the Federal Parliament is yet to pass legislation to end the Schoolkids Bonus, the July instalment will be automatically paid to eligible families and students, between 2 and 16 July 2014. 


