students were looking at averages, means and medians and talking cricket scores!



# Dear Parents, Guardians and Old Scholars and Friends,


On Wednesday I spoke to all Year 10 students and I congratulated them on their wonderful year so far.

# Learning in Focus

## K-6 Year 6 Canberra trip



The Year 6 trip to Canberra in the last week of Term 3 was a tremendous learning experience for everyone. Each place visited provided new insights and educational richness to our History units about 'Democracy' and 'The Australian Government'. Everyone who accessed the BLOG thought it was a fantastic way to keep informed and felt connected to our adventures.

Students gained exposure to significant historical events and artefacts at the National Museum. They were taken on a journey of our past from Aboriginal culture and art, the early settlement days, the birth of Federation, our political system and the Constitution. The opportunity to pay their respects



to, and learn about our brave and committed service men and women at the War Memorial was an inspirational journey of commitment and sacrifice. This year we were also fortunate to see the House of Representatives and the Senate sitting. Students

listened in to some of the discussions taking place as well as receiving information from our guide about the structure and inner workings of the political system. Students were also treated to morning tea with Senator Eric Abetz and were then

joined by our Independent Member for Dennison, Mr Andrew Wilkie.

The worlds of Science and Technology as well as Sport were explored and thoroughly enjoyed by all with visits to Questacon



and the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) where hands on activities and an evening swim were enjoyed by all.

Thanks to the Australian Government for providing support of \$150 funding (PACER) per student, deducted from the cost per head to reduce the total amount payable for families.

# 7-10 Review of the Australian Curriculum

The Australian Curriculum was developed as a national curriculum recognising the entitlement of each student to knowledge, understanding and skills and clarifying what teachers teach. Dominic College teachers have put extensive time and effort into



plans to deliver the Australian Curriculum content through engaging and enriching lessons. This process has been valuable for our teachers to document what they teach and to work collaboratively on planning and share resources.

A review of the Australian Curriculum has been undertaken by the Australian Government and the final Review Report is now available. There has been much media hype about the report with a focus on the concerns raised about the curriculum by the reviewers. At Dominic College we regularly undertake reviews of our programs to ensure we achieve best possible outcomes. We are supportive of the Government's undertaking to review the Australian Curriculum and support many of the recommendations.

One particular issue of note is crowding of the curriculum. We recognise this has been occurring, especially in primary education, due to the developments and changes in our world resulting in more content to be covered. At Dominic we have tried to ensure that the curriculum plans we have developed are balanced and especially provide depth in key areas of literacy and numeracy.

We have been reassured there will be no sudden changes to the Australian Curriculum that will impact on schooling in the short-term. The recommendations will be considered by states and territory governments who will then develop time frames for changes to be implemented and acted on. There is no suggestion of a complete overhaul to the Australian Curriculum but rather a strengthening of the curriculum and a focus on balance to ensure we are delivering a world class education nationally.

At Dominic College we want to ensure that the curriculum we deliver is tailored to the needs of our students. Our focus will continue to be on literacy and numeracy which we believe are foundational skills. We are currently developing an updated Literacy Plan as we continue to review and evaluate our curriculum delivery to improve student achievement.




# SPORT NEWS
