Dear Friends

It is hard to believe that Easter is only a few days away! Easter, like Christmas, began as a religious celebration, but has gradually been taken over by the secular world and turned into a commercial and holiday opportunity. But for many people, Easter remains one of the most important events in the calendar – **for religious reasons.**

Easter has a special meaning in the life and context of Don Bosco and his mission.

For a start, it was on Easter Sunday in 1846 when Don Bosco took possession of the permanent location of his educational work, in a shed and local paddock on the outskirts (then) of the city of Turin – in an area known as Valdocco.

That site remain the "cradle" of Don Bosco's work, and one can still visit the original building, as well as other historical buildings.

Here Mamma Margaret established her first kitchen for homeless boys, and provided shelter, and motherly care for them.

It was on Easter Sunday 1934 when Don Bosco was proclaimed a Saint of the Catholic Church by the Pope of the time. So Easter is directly connected with the holiness and mission of Don Bosco. The fresh hope, the great joy, the reassurance, the deep peace, the contagious faith and the courage of the witnesses of the Risen Jesus were all qualities that marked Don Bosco's life. No wonder the movement for the education of the young begun by Don Bosco has flooded the whole world.

Dominic College is part of this movement. Let us not forget the source of this vitality: Jesus the Risen Son of God.



Guest Speaker – Mitch McPherson Speak Up and Stay ChatTY

On Friday 13 March, Dominic College students had the privilege of listening to Mitch McPherson speaking at a 7-10 assembly.

Mitch is a suicide prevention advocate who decided to turn his family's personal tragedy into a positive message, after his younger brother committed suicide. Mitch started the Speak Up Stay ChatTY campaign – a play on his brother Ty's name – that encourages conversations about the taboo subject of suicide.

Mitch has created and sold more than 6,000 car bumper stickers, with all proceeds supporting suicide prevention programs with his not-for-profit organisation.

In 2014, Mitch and six friends ran the 330 kilometres from Burnie to Hobart in four days, raising more than \$40,000 and gaining state-wide recognition.

While Mitch wishes his commitment was sparked by different circumstances, he is single-minded in his determination to drive change.

Mitch was nominated for Young Australian of the Year in 2015 and his organisation is now partnering with Relationships Australia in Tasmania to spread his message, speaking at schools and suicide prevention forums to break down the stigma that stops young people from sharing their problems.

Following is a quote from Mitch's Facebook Page – Speak Up and Stay ChatTY

"Today's presentation at Dominic College was one of the best experiences I have had since working in this space. To have the 500 odd students listen to my story attentively, and then to spend time with them at lunch and have them approach for a sticker and a chat was honestly really moving. A lot of them knew about stay chatTY and I was simply proud to be representing "Suicide Awareness". The students appreciated the work we did and they agreed that there is a real need for it in our schools. So thank you to everyone at Dominic for having us."

This term MWEW at Dominic College has a strong focus on the importance of Drinking Water for a healthy lifestyle. Tips from this weeks poster:


Before activity - encourage several gulps of water

CAREERS & MATHS WITH DOMINOES

Careers and Pathway Planning

In their recent Empower classes, Year 10s began to look at careers that interest them and the specific skills associated with these careers.

This will assist them in their decision-making about vocational pathways in College and beyond. In their research, students were asked to consider the following areas of their selected careers:



- Description of the work - the type of tasks performed
- The effect of technology changing the nature of the work
- Working conditions and environment
- The wages/salaries for that work
- The skills required for specific tasks in this career
- Employability skills that apply to the work
- Education or training qualifications required for the work/occupation
- Advantages and disadvantages of the occupation
- Future prospects for the job
- Their own personal suitability for the work



Engaging in the above task allows students to make links between their short-term goal setting at school and their longer term pathway planning.

Below are a number of resources our students and parents can use to investigate possible pathways.

These include:

- Myfuture (www.myfuture.edu.au) a fantastic career information and exploration service, which all Year 10s will use this year in their pathway planning
- MyUniversity (www.myuniversity.gov.au) a one-stop website to investigate courses at all Australian Universities
- My Skills (www.myskills.gov.au) information about vocational education and training options
- Job Guide (www.jobguide.education.gov.au). Hard copies of this resource will be available later in the year and is a fantastic resource for information on all careers.

Do you remember dominoes?

A national supermarket is giving away dominoes with each \$20 spent.

Although they are a promotional gimmick for a movie promotion, if you do keep them there is an opportunity for some mathematical challenges at home!

Dr Catherine Attard, lecturer in primary mathematics pedagogy at the University of Western Sydney has some great ideas (in a blog at engagingmaths.co) for your children at home:



- Order the dominoes from the smallest total to the highest total (or back to front)
- How many combinations of dominoes add to...(pick a total – being aware that some totals have more combinations than others)
- Play a game of dominoes (great for young children practicing matching and subitising)



- How many different ways can you make a total of 15 out of two dominoes? What about a total of 20?
- Turn your dominoes face down (picture face up), choose three dominoes and arrange them so that when you add them, the total is as close to 100 as possible. How close did you get?
- Make the longest possible domino train that adds up to a total of 15/20/25
- Sort your dominoes (any way you like) and ask someone if your family to work out how you sorted them

I encourage parents to take this opportunity and make the most of it - you might as well make the experience educational! Maybe you can even find that old set of dominoes you have in the cupboard, and have a go, too!
